CHICAGO WHEAT OFF A CENT

Trading Was Limited and Prices
Were Depressed.

Crop Damage Talk to the Front,
Without Any Stimulating Effect
Yesterday - Liverpool Futures
Did Not Fluctuate Much - Corn
Markets Easy - Local Grain,
Produce and Live Stock.

Friday Evening, April 7.
Liverpool wheat futures to-day were de-
pressed early, but recovered and closed at
yesterday's final figures. Paris wheat de-
clined 10 centimes and Paris flour 5 to 10
centimes to-day.

Chicago's wheat market was comparatively
dull and heavy to-day. Crop damage
reports are still in front, but they
failed to stimulate the market to-day. Fu-
tures receded about a cent, and closed near
the bottom.

Liverpool maize futures were easier to-
day, and spot maize sold off sharply. Chi-
cago corn declined 1/4 cent per bushel to-day.

Peas declined 1/4 cent at Liverpool.

Argentine wheat shipments the past week
2,048,000 bushels; maize 140,000 bushels.
Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past
three days 488,000 bushels, including 224,
000 of American. Corn same time, 338,000
bushels, all American. Shipments for con-
responding week of 1896 were: Wheat
1,672,000 bushels, corn 95,000 bushels.
Exports at New York to-day: Flour 31,500
barrels and 35,307 sacks; wheat 11,984 bush-
els.

LOCAL LIVE STOCK.

The run of live stock at the cattle mar-
ket here to-day was large—49 car
loads of 1200 cattle, 125 sheep and
yearling lambs, 50 calves and 1000 hogs.
The quality of fat cattle generally good.
Several loads of well finished export cattle
being offered.

On account of the heavy deliveries of
Thursday and to-day, which amounted all
told to 115 car loads, the market was
effectively eased in the morning. But con-
sidering the heavy receipts, there was a fair
trade, and a large number of cattle had
changed hands by noon, at the following
quotations:

Export Cattle—Choice loads of heavy ex-
porters sold at \$4.50 to \$5.00; light exporters
at \$4.75 to \$5.00.

Loads of good butchers and exporters,
mixed, sold at \$4.50 to \$4.75 per cwt.

Very inferior rough cows and bulls sold at
\$3.20 to \$3.40 per cwt.

Stockers—Deliveries were more liberal
with prices remaining easy at \$5.50 to \$5.80
per cwt.

Feeders—Heavy feeders, weighing 1000 to
1150 lbs., scarce and worth from \$4.15 to
\$4.30 per cwt.

Stock Heifers—A few heifers for stock
purposes sold at \$3 per cwt.

Stock Bulls—Inferior stock bulls sold at
\$2.50 per cwt.

Feeding Bulls—Bulls suitable for the byres
are worth about \$3 to \$3.25 per cwt.

Calves—About 80 were offered, the bulk
of which were of inferior quality. Prices
remain unchanged at \$2 for inferior to
\$7 for medium and \$10 for extra good
veals.

Sheep—The run of sheep and yearling
lambs still continues light, not more than
125 coming in to-day. Ewes sold at \$3 to
\$3.50; bucks, \$2.75 to \$3 per cwt.

Yearling Lambs—Prices for grain-fed
lambs were higher, selling at \$3 to \$3.50
per cwt., while common barnyard lambs
sold at \$3.50 to \$3.75.

Spring Lambs—Only a few of these were
offered, selling from \$2 to \$3 each; those
at the former price were inferior.

Milk Cows—About 12 springers and
milkers of inferior to medium quality only,
sold at \$25 to \$40 each.

1000 hogs were delivered.

Prices unchanged at \$4.37 1/2 for choice
select bacon hogs, weighing 200 lbs., and
\$4.40 for a thick fat at \$3.75
per cwt.

William Leveck bought 175 cattle, mixed
butchers and exporters, at \$3.85 to \$4.00;
several bulls for export at \$3.65 to \$4.12 1/2
per cwt.

A. McIntosh bought two loads of export
at \$4.00 to \$5.00 per cwt.

Vance sold one load butchers' cattle,
1000 lbs. each, at \$4.00 per head.

Leveck bought eight choice butch-
ers' cattle at an average price of \$4.75
per cwt.
