A National Matter.

Hon. Mr. Drummond said the matter was a very important one. It was a national one. The presence of piling grounds in the city was an eternal menace. The city itself should take steps to protect the dwelling houses. He had been struck by the fact yesterday that nearly every house in the city was roofed with shingles. When they caught the house was doomed. He himself had seen the fire leap the river and alight in lumber piles, forming a new fire. Other fires had arisen from the scattering of burning shingles. In Montreal the building of wooden houses was prohobited, as was the roofing with shingles. The Government should insist on the removal of the piling grounds.

A Grant Without Delay.

Sir M. Bowell strongly recommended the making by the Government of an immediate grant. Thousands were homeless and hardy knew where to get breakfast or to sleep onight. He made the suggestion that the covernment should make an immediate appropriation, with some diffidence, as the lenate had no power to take the initiative.

HOW THE BUILDINGS ARE MENACED.

Sir M. Bowell said it was rumored that the supply of water in the Parliament Buildings was so meagre that it would have been ipmossible to utilize those stretched across the grounds in case of need. He was informed that the appliances for securing a supply of water in large quantities, had been removed, and that now they were dependent on electricity. They should not be at the mercy of a wire, which could be cut, or on the burning of a pole.

Hon. R. W. Scott said this was not so. After the West Block fire a large pipe, especially for the supply of this building, had been laid down. This was supplied from the pump house. The lack of pressure yesterday was due to the amount of water taken by the hydrauts in the western part of the city.
