The main point just now, however, is to bring matters to a condition where it is possible to employ men at all; and it looks as if the labor question would be postponed for some time. The latest advices, however, which point to the probable surrender of General Botha, and the concession of terms upon which the Boers still in the field can come in, seem to indicate a nearer conclusion to the war than has recently seemed probable. At the best, if another month should see the end of hostilities and the opening of Johannesburg to the mine operators and their forces, it will take several months to put matters in order, and we cannot expect production to be resumed before the second half of the year.

The test of the labor demand will come then, and it is altogether possible that the rush for men will be enough to upset present calculations and demoralize the market for Kaffir labor. There will be, doubtless, much anxiety to get to work as soon as possible, chiefly for effect on the stock market, and managers' instructions will not permit them to deliberate. It is easier to arrange terms now than it will be to carry them out when the rush comes.
