Radium as Hydrophobia Cure, Milan, June 10.—In memoranda communicated to the Academy of Sciences of Bologna Prof. Tizzoni and Sig. Bongiovanni, a student, publish the results of experiments by which Tizzoni maintains that he succeeded in curing hydrophobia by the influence of radium. After injecting into rabbits the most violent hydrophobia virus existing he subjected them periodically for several days to the influence of radium. All the rabbits thug treated were cured, while others likewise inoculated, but not subjected to the cure, died of hydrophobia.
