FRENCH SECRETS

Starting Story as to Who Sold Them—Real Culprit Was a Russian Ambassador.

London, March 17.—The Evening News publishes a sensational Dreyfus story. It declares that the former Russian ambassador to Paris, Count Von Mohrenheim, is the real culprit who sold both Russian and French secrets to the German Gov- ernment, adding "that the Russian Government itself is convinced of his guilt, and that it is only to avoid a public scandal, greater than the Dreyfus affair, that he is unpunished, further than the intimation that he is not to show his face within the czar's dominions."

Kingston, Jamaica, March 17.—A

correspondent at Cayenne, capital of French Guiana, writes that Dreyfus, the famous French military prisoner, is exciting little public interest there, but that private circles feel strongly against him, some predicting his re- turn to his place of captivity on Devil's Island, off that coast. This is looked upon as implying that Drey- fus was recently removed from Devil's Island to Cayenne.

British and American Representa- tives Propose United Action.
St. Petersburg Powder Magazine Was Threatened With Destruction.

The German Portion of the Cape-to-

Cairo Railroad To Be Built and Worked by Germans—Norway Wants to Secede From Union With Sweden.

London, March 17.—The Shanghai cor- respondent of the Daily Mail says: "The preposterous demands of the Chinese have brought the negotiations for the extension of the cosmopolitan set- tlement to a deadlock, and the British and American Associations, which met jointly yesterday to advocate united action by the two governments, adopted resolutions of the most vigorous char- acter, which will be transmitted to London and Washington."

The Japanese government, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Times, has requested China to sanction the ap- pointment of a Japanese customs com- missioner at Fu Chau, capital of the Province of Fe Kien, on the Min River. This town, Fu Chau, carries on a large commerce with the maritime provinces of China, both by land and water, and also with the Lee Chee Islands and Japan.

Prince Henry of Prussia has started for Kiaoh Chau Bay, where all the war vessels composing the two German squadrons in far eastern waters will assemble for the formal transfer of the commandership from Admiral Von Diederichs to Prince Henry.

A dispatch from Rome says that Lord Salisbury, through Sir Philip Currie, the British ambassador, has thanked Admiral Canavaro, Italian minister of foreign affairs, for Italy's prompt and loyal action in the Martino incident.

DENMARK IN IT, TOO.

The Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "It is asserted that M. Helde, director of the Danish East Asia Steamship Company, is about to go to China in the company's inter- ests. It is also said that he has a government mission to seek some con- venient harbor in China, as Denmark intends to follow in the footsteps of other powers."

RUSSIA WAS WARNED IN TIME.
London, March 17.—The Vienna cor- respondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "A startling story, emanating from an absolutely trustworthy source, is for- warded from St. Petersburg. It ap- pears that on the day preceding the explosion of the navy powder magazine at La Goubbran, near Toulon, the Rus- sian minister of war, Lieut.-Gen. Kouropatkin, received telegraphic news that both the Toulon and St. Petersburg powder stores would be ex- ploded within 24 hours. He immedi- ately drove to the powder magazine, and after an inspection, gave every employe three days' leave, installing fresh guards and establishing a military con- don, and taking other precautions."

THE DISARMAMENT IDEA.

The Brussels correspondent of the London Daily Mail says that the dis- armament conference, which will meet at The Hague on May 18, will be com- posed of three sections, dealing respec- tively with disarmament, arbitration and "other matters."

BARON RUSSELL APPOINTED.

Baron Russell of Killowen, lord chief justice of England, has been appointed to succeed the late Baron Herschell on the Venezuelan arbitration commis- sion.

BORROWED 30,000,000 PESETAS.

Madrid, March 17.—The Spanish Gov- ernment has concluded a loan of 30,000,000 pesetas. The money was handed over, and will be devoted to paying the arrears due Spanish troops which have served in Cuba.

The cabinet council decided that the treaty of peace with the United States should be ratified immediately after the dissolution of the cortes. The election of the new chamber will be fixed for April 6, and for the senate April 30, the new cortes to reassemble on May 2.

The queen regent has signed the de- crees dissolving the cortes, invoking the new parliament and authorizing the payment of arrears of pay to the re- patriated troops.

BURIED BY TORCHLIGHT.

Friedrichsruhe, March 17.—Emperor William yesterday attended the interment of the remains of Prince and princess Bismarck in the new mauso- leum. The coffin containing the remains of Princess Bismarck was borne at the head of the procession. It was fol- lowed by Prince Bismarck's coffin, behind which walked Emperor William, with Prince Herbert Bismarck on his left. Then came the members of the family. The procession passed between the ranks of 1,500 torch-bearers, a military band playing a funeral march. The emperor was cordial in his demeanor throughout the ceremonies.

RHODES AND THE KAISER.

London, March 17.—The Berlin cor- respondent of the Standard, discuss- ing the recent visit to the German capital of Cecil Rhodes, in con- nection with his Cape-to-Cairo railway project says: Emperor William gave his photograph, with his autograph, indorsed, to Mr. Rhodes. The gov- ernment, it is believed, will submit to the reichstag a bill asking a guaran- tee of 3 per cent interest for the por- tion of the line which is to cross German territory in East Africa. This section will be built and worked ex- clusively by Germans and superintend- ed by the German Government. It is not unlikely, however, that a portion of the capital will be offered for sub- scription in England."

BAD BOILERS.

An inquiry has been opened into the death of the stoker of the British first-class cruiser Terrible, who was killed by a boiler explosion on board the cruiser while she was
