WOMAN'S MUSIC CLUB

HAS SUCCESSFUL YEAR DESPITE CONDITIONS

Reports at Annual Meeting Most Favorable.

One of the most successful years, financially and educationally, in the 23 years' history of the London Woman's Music Club, was reported at the annual meeting which took place yesterday afternoon in Wesley Hall, instead of the Normal School, where the recitals have been held during several seasons.

Notwithstanding the difficulties presented by conditions of the fourth year of war, the club ends its season with a balance of between \$30 and \$40 in its regular fund, and a within short distance of the total of \$500 for the special fund to furnish a ward in the Byron Sanatorium for Tuberculous Soldiers. The mission of furnishing the ward was undertaken a year ago at the beginning of April, and by July 25th had been turned over to the Red Cross, and a balance of \$32 or \$33 placed in the bank as the nucleus of the last half.

Nearly \$200 has been raised since the end of October by the proceeds of the Carrie-Martin concert, which opened the season's musical work, and the club, through the efforts of Mrs. John Daly and Mrs. Randle Brown, who themselves bore all the expenses of the musical work, have been able to furnish a ward in the Byron Sanatorium for Tuberculous Soldiers. \$778,960 ESTATE

LEFT TO WIDOW BY

LATE T. H. SMALLMAN

Will Be Divided at Her Death Between Two Children.

HEAVY OIL STOCK HOLDER

\$625,250 Represented by Shares in Imperial Oil Company.

According to the will of T. H. Smallman, entered for probate today, the late London financier and businessman left an estate of \$778,960.25. This estate, the bulk of which is represented by a block of Imperial Oil stock valued at \$625,250, is left to his widow Ellen, to be divided at her death between his two children, Capt. J. E. Smallman and Mrs. (Col.) Eleanor E. B. Morgan. The will, which was dated February 12, 1905, was a short one. It places the value of the estate at \$778,960.25, made up of:

Real estate \$14,985.00

Securities 45,191.25

Stocks 712,450.00

Miscellaneous 1,000.00

The stocks represent holdings in banks and insurance companies, etc., in addition to the big block of Imperial Oil stock, while in the miscellaneous items are included motor cars, etc.

The executors of the estate are the widow and the two children. Provision is made that in the case of the death of any of the place will be taken by the London and Western Trusts Company. The entire estate is willed to the widow during her lifetime, and at her death the estate will be given to the son, John Elton Smallman, while the household furniture, books, paintings, china and so on, will become the property of Mrs. Morgan. The remainder of the estate will be sold and the proceeds divided evenly between the two beneficiaries. In the event of the death of either of the two children their portion of the estate is to be held in trust.
