KING AND KAISER EMBRACE AND MAKE-UP; BIG CROWDS CHEER MEETING OF MONARCHS A Report That Seems to Have Originated

His Majesty and Suite Arrive at Cronberg and Is Cordially Welcomed by Emperor —Teutonic Press Sees End to Misunderstandings.

Cronberg, Hesse-Nassau, Prussia, Aug. 15 .- King Edward arrived here on a special train from Frankfort at 8:45 today. Emperor William and Prince and Princess Frederick Charles. of Hesse-Nassau, met him at the railroad station. The Emperor assisted the King in alighting and they kissed each other on both cheeks. The meeting was very cordial. The King wore a black Prince Albert coat, and a silk hat. The Emperor had on the uniform of the Posen Jaeger regiment, with a steel helmet. King Edward was accompanied by Sir Charles Hardinge, per manent under secretary of the foreign office, Major General Sir Stanley Clarke, chief equerry, and Major Frederick E. G. Ponsonby, equerry to his majesty.

Sir Frank Lascelles, the British ambassador to Germany, and the British consul general. Francis Oppenheimer joined the royal party at Frankfort.

After introductions had been exchanged the royal party and their following proceeded to Friedrichshof in automobiles. The streets were profusely decorated with evergreens, flags and fly cheered by the crowds and school children, who were lined up all along the route. What Will They Discuss?

London, Aug. 15.-The strictest silence is maintained in official circles as to the subjects to be discussed by King Edward and Emperor William at their meeting at Freidrichshof. Up to the last moment it was not admitted at the foreign office here that Sir Charles Hardinge, permanent under secretary of the foreign office, would accompany the King. He had been away on a holiday and broke it up to join the royal party on the continent. His presence adds significance to the meeting, for as the permanent under secretary of the foreign office he is really the man who carries on the foreign affairs of the country, and the fact that he is attending King Edward leads to the belief here that the discussion between their majesties will be of the widest range, taking in all questions outstanding between the two countries, and those likely to come up in the future.

SCHEME FOR LONDON

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP

Mayor Judd intends to bring in a motion in the council shortly to have the people vote on the purchase of the London Street Railway Company and the London Electric Company, in January

Around the city hall, however, the dea is not seriously entertained. It is hardly likely that Mayor Judd will bring in a motion to ask the ratepayers sonally interested, as he is in the London Electric Company.

The London Street Railway is now capitalized at about \$1,000,000, \$500,000 this being in stock and \$500,000 in bonds. The franchise has only nineteen years to run, and it is not reasonable to suppose that the people are so anxious for the line that they are ready today to buy it at the amount of its capitalization, a large proportion of which no doubt represents the value of the franchise, which reverts to the city

The statement is solemnly made in the Free Press that if London ran its own street railway and electric lighting system it would be able to bring Niagara power here on its own account, without reference to other municipalities

It has been estimated by experts that London could use about 5,000-horsepower, if Niagara power was being sold

The street railway would use about 1,200-horsepower, and the remainder present one.
