#### Pumped Blood Into Dying One

New York, March 30 .- For the first time in this city, transfusion of blood was resorted to yesterday to save the life of a patient, says a dispatch from Philadelphia. Mrs. Peter Anderson was dying from anaemia in the Polychnic Hospital. The doctors decided on a bold stroke to save her life, and the husband of the dying woman cheerfully permitted a quantity of his blood to be pumped into his wife's veins. The woman was brought back to consciou ness, and now has more than a late lance for complete recovery. son himself, though weakened by the loss of blood and the ordeal of the operation, soon railied, and bids fare to be himself again

Anderson was anaesthetized and the pulse artery in his left arm was severed. The large vein in Mrs. Anderson's left arm was severed and the artery of her husband was inserted in the incision.
