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

# Who Will Help Rebuild THE BURNED CHURCH?

On February 7, at 4 o'clock in the morning, fire broke out in the beautiful new Egerton Street Baptist Church at London, Ont., and in two hours all that was left was a heap of smoking ruins.

The church was dedicated only five years ago, since when the people, composed exclusively of wage-earners, have made an heroic struggle to pay the interest and reduce the principal. The building cost some \$30,000. Insurance amounted to \$20,000, which must all be paid over to the original contractors. The congregation is left with nothing-must start again at rock bottom.

Yet immediately upon the heels of their disaster, these people insisted upon playing their part in the great forward movement, and have raised one-half their objective,

### AND NOT A MONEYED MAN IN THE CONGREGATION

Before the ruins were cold came offers of help. A check for \$50 from a local Methodist layman was the first tangible expression of sympathy. A prominent Anglican and a Presbyterian each sent checks for \$100. Last Sunday, a little girl of three presented the minister with her savings bank containing coppers gathered for months, and insisted upon the acceptance of her \$3.52 to help build a new church.

Two soldiers at Guelph Military Hospital sent \$5.00 and \$1.00, respectively. A retired minister from a small Ontario town sent \$25, regretting what he termed the smallness of his gift, and stating that his salary had stopped last April. To date, something over \$2,000 has been received without any appeal having been made, but the people of this church will have to raise many times that sum, and
