BIRD NOTES

nithological Club.)

April is the month when most of the wild ducks pass through Southern Ontario from their winter homes in the South to their breeding grounds on the northern lakes. As they pass they often stop for rest and food on the river or small ponds about London. This spring we have had a very good list. Nine species being found by club members—the American and Hooded Mergansers, the Buff-breast, Blue-winged Teal, Ring-necked, Golden-eye, Fuddy and Black. The rarest of the list is the Ring-necked, a duck with black head and back, white sides and a bluish bill with a couple of white bands. In fact, "ring-billed" would be a better name than "ring-necked". Most of these migrating ducks are all ready mated. For this reason spring shooting is prohibited by law, as the destruction of a duck now means one family less in the fall. The members of the McIlwraith Ornithological Club have been appointed officials for the enforcement of this and other game laws, and it is hoped that the amount of illegal shooting will be reduced.

POWER SITUATION IS AGAIN NORMAL

London Housewives Can Now
Use Electric Stoves.

London's power situation is normal once more. Ice from the Great Lakes interfered with the intake pipes of the power plants at Niagara Wednesday, and as a result London's allotment of power, with that of other cities, was reduced almost 50 per cent.

Even with this sudden reduction it was possible to keep the factories and street railway supplied, and the domestic circuits were the only ones on which the reduction was noticed. The trouble at Niagara ended almost as suddenly as it had begun, and at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon as much power was available as the city could use.

The shutdown this time caused much less inconvenience than some of those earlier in the year. Electric lights were not needed to such an extent and citizens using electrical cooking appliances, vacuum cleaners, and other similar electric equipment, were the only ones who were affected.

STOCK MARKETS MAKING RECOVERY

After Steady Selling by Japs
Wednesday.

The New York and Chicago stock markets, which had been in a state of heavy selling since Tuesday, are slowly recovering. Crucible Steel gained 7½ points before 1 o'clock, and General Motors which took a large tumble yesterday, was going up steadily, having gained 10 points by 1 o'clock.

All other stocks were climbing, most of them having opened at a much higher rate than they closed at yesterday, and after declining somewhat, kept climbing until they were approaching normal.

Outside of the fact that practically every stock on the market tumbled, the case was not out of the ordinary, as fluctuations have been great during the last four months, local brokers stated.

A local stockbroker stated this afternoon that the sudden drop in the market yesterday was due to Japan selling heavily in all stocks on the American market.

The broker stated that through the early part of the war Japan bought heavily in American stocks, as their trade balance was growing rapidly through orders placed with them by the Allied governments.

Since that time the Japanese trade has been falling off considerably, with the result that they need all money they can get up for use in foreign trading. The result was the heavy selling on the market from Japan.

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LARGE GRADUATING CLASS FOR WESTERN UNIVERSITY

Many Returned Soldier Students Will Take B. A. Degree,
Announces Dr. K. P. R. Neville.

One of the largest graduating classes in the history of the Western University will take their degrees this summer, according to Dr. K. P. R. Neville, registrar of the university. It is expected that 22 students will take the degree of bachelor of arts, two masters of arts, and eleven will graduate in medicine.

During the war the size of the classes suffered because a large number of the men who would have graduated were overseas. They practically have all returned, and almost without exception, those who had only one year to go in order to get their degree, have returned, and will graduate this summer. This accounts for the exceptionally large class this year.

The class of medical graduates will be practically the same size as during the past years.

Building figures for the month reached a total of \$139,180 today, and passed the total of \$137,000 obtained during the whole month of April last year.

Skoggs, one-story brick veneer dwelling, Thompson avenue, \$3,000; London Cold Storage Company, one-story brick office on Rathurst street, \$2,000.

Railway Clerks in Favor of Leaving International Brotherhood.

Strong feeling for a secession from the International Brotherhood and for a union with the Canadian Brotherhood was voiced at an open meeting of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, held at the K. of P. Hall, 350 Richmond street, on Wednesday night. The taking over of the roads by the government is said to be responsible for the secession.

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WANTS HOUSING COM. ORGANIZED

E. R. Dennis Speaks at C. of C.
Luncheon.

Organization of a housing company to build cheap houses for either sale or rent was recommended by E. R. Dennis, chairman of the London housing commission, in the course of an address before the members of the London Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon in the Trenchard House today. The recommendation, seconded as a motion by Clerk Baker, was unanimously referred for consideration to the executive of the Chamber of Commerce.

Following the address by Mr. Dennis, Major T. J. Murphy drew attention to the fact that the man who most needs assistance is the man who cannot be helped by housing schemes, providing houses worth from \$2,500 upwards. Mr. Dennis declared that frankly speaking the housing commission could do nothing under the present housing act to help the man who can only afford to pay \$15 or \$20 a month rent. He suggested a housing company, organized under the old act, under which it could borrow \$5 per cent of the money required. Or the manufacturers and the chamber of commerce could get together and guarantee the construction of a few soldiers, who could not afford to advance one-tenth of the cost of construction.

Vacant Lots.
There are 6,500 vacant lots in London, the speaker indicated, and he pointed out that the city is in a position to build houses for its employees. The duty of the housing commission is to build houses for its employees. The duty of the housing commission is to build houses for its employees.

In 1914, there were built 462 houses in London at an average cost of a little more than \$1,800. In 1915, the number of houses built was 462, at an average cost of \$1,876. With only 75 houses built in 1916, the average cost was \$1,900, and in 1917, the average cost was \$2,000. The average cost jumped to \$2,272. Had the city built 200 houses last year, it would have saved \$20,000 in increased building costs, it must face today.

Even if the city should lose \$50,000 in building houses this year, said Mr. Dennis, it might very profitably be charged up to the city's promotion account.

Nine houses built last year on Beattie street are now occupied. About fifty houses are to be built in Pine Lawn, on a miniature town-planning idea.

There are 162 applicants for houses to be built by the commission. Values of proposed houses range from \$3,400 to \$4,500. The latter on Cathcart street, South London.

Brass ferrules, soldering nipples, flanges and tubing shall be regulated by the provisions of the old plumbing bylaw until the new one became operative. There are only a few copies of this old bylaw available. To get around this difficulty the inspector has ordered the regulations and sent them out in letter form to every plumber in the city, as follows:

"A permit shall be required on all work except necessary minor repairs, and a plan of same filed in this office. A water test shall be required on all roughing in, but the smoke test on the finished work may be dispensed with. Material to be used: Soft pipe.
