April is the month when most of the wild ducks pass through Southern Ontario from their winter homes in the South to their breeding grounds on the northern lakes. On their way they often stop for rest and food on the river or small ponds about London. This spring we have had a very good list. nine species being found by club mem-bers—the American and Hooded Mer-gansers, the Bufflehead, Bluebill, Old-Squaw, Ring-Necked, Golden-Eye, Ruddy and Black ducks. The rarest of the list is the Ring-Neck, a duck with black head and back, white sides and a black head and back, white sides and a bluish bill with a couple of white bands. In fact, "ring-billed duck" would be a better name than "ring-neck."

POWER SITUATION LARGE GRADUATING CLASS IS AGAIN NORMAL

London Housewives Can Now Use Electric Stoves.

London's power situation is normal once more. Ice from the Great Lakes interfered with the intake pipes of the power plants at Niagara Wednesday and as a result London's allotment of power, with that of other cities, was reduced almost 50 per cent.
Even with this sudden reduction it was possible to keep the factories and street railway supplied, and the domestic circuits were the only ones or which the reduction was noticed. The which the reduction was noticed. The trouble at Niagara ended almost as suddenly as it had begun, and at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon as much power was available as the city could use.

The shutdown this time caused much less inconvenience than some of those earlier in the year. Electric lights were not needed to such an extent and citizens using electrical cooking appliances, vacuum cleaners, and other similar electric cooking appliances.

WANTS HOUSING

City Clerk Baker, was unanimously referred for consideration to the executive of the Chamber of Commerce.

Following the address by Mr. Dennis, Major T. J. Murphy drew attention to the fact that the man who most needs assistance is the man who cannot be helped by housing schemes, providing houses worth from \$3.500 upwards.

Mr. Dennis declared that frankly speaking, the housing commission could do nothing under the present housing act to help the man who can only afford to pay \$18 or \$20 a month rent. He suggested a housing company, organized under the old act, under which it could borrow \$5 per cent of the money required. Or the manufacturers and the chamber of commerce could get together Today's Total Reaches Sum of chamber of commerce could get together and guarantee the payments of return-ed soldiers, who could not afford to ad-vance one-tenth of the cost of construc-

Building figures for the month reached a total of \$133,180 today, and passed the total of \$137,000 attained during the whole month of April last year. The total is likely to be increased considerably before the end of the month. Building Inspector A. M. Piper said. The total reached so far this year is now more than \$50,000 ahead of that reached by the end of April last year. There are 6,500 vacant lots in London. The inducement par excellence to any industry to locate in a city is today houses for its employees. The duty of the housing commission is one of civic betterment, said Mr. Dennis.

In 1914, there were built 462 houses in London at any average cost of a little more than \$1.800. In 1915, the average cost was only \$1.808, but only 287 houses were built. In 1916, were built 193 houses, and the next year only 122, with the average cost increased to \$1.876. With only 75 houses built in 1918, the average cost was \$1.900, and in 1919, there were built 270 houses, but the average cost jumped to \$2.722. that reached by the end of April last year.

Last year was a record one in the building line, as operations totaling more than two million dollars were commenced. In spite of the fact that the figures this year are keeping well ahead of last year's totals, Mr. Piper does not think that the total for the year will be any greater, if as great. He points out that some large building operations, including two theatres, were commenced last year. It is hardly likely that anything corresponding to these will be started this year. An extensive building program, however, may bring the total for the year close to the two-million-dollar mark.
