Executive Conference of All Sixteen Unions Except Telegraphers Announces Decision — Railways Announce Estimated Increase in Rates.

CHICAGO, July 22.—Acceptance under protest of the United States Railway Labor Board's wage award was decided upon at an executive conference here tonight by all of the sixteen recognized unions except one, it was announced following the meeting by Timothy Shea, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen.

The one exception was the Order of Railway Telegraphers, which referred the proposition to its membership, together with a strike proposal.

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MYSTERY OF LOST BRITISH BATTALION IS SOLVED AT LAST

Skeletons of Members of Fifth Norfolk's Found.

KAISER FIGHTS FOR HIS RICHES

Hohenzollerns in Struggle With Reichstag; William Great Landlord.

FOUGHT TO LAST

Charged Into Dense Forest in Gallipoli and Never Returned.

LONDON, July 22.—One of the mysteries of the war, the fate of part of a battalion of an English territorial regiment, the Fifth Norfolk, in the fighting at Suvla Bay, Gallipoli, has at last been solved. Sir Ian Hamilton, in his dispatch on the fighting round Anafarta on August 12, 1915, referred to the fate of the battalion as a very mysterious thing. On the night of the attack they found themselves less strenuously opposed than the rest of the brigade, and under Col. Sir H. Beauchamp, the men eagerly pressed forward. Some were wounded or exhausted and found their way back to camp.

"But the colonel with 15 officers and 250 men," continued Hamilton's dispatch, "still kept pushing on, driving the enemy before him. Amongst these ardent souls was part of a fine company enlisted from the King's Sandringham estates. Nothing more was heard of them or of any of them. They charged into the forest and were lost to sight and sound. Not one of them was seen again."

The first into which the battalion gallantly charged was never taken by British troops. The men who fell into the hands of the Turks, it was afterwards found, had fallen out of a tank earlier and not a man of Colonel Beauchamp's force was made prisoner. Rev. C. S. Edwards has just returned from a visit to the peninsula on graves registration work. He says that on going over Anafarta plain he found the skeletons of the men of the 4th and 5th Hampshire over a mile in front of the British lines. The skeletons of the 4th Hampshire were found in a trench. Apparently the battalions had advanced in perfect order, and to all appearances had been caught in a machine-gun fire. One man had taken cover behind a stone, and a large pile of empty cartridges cases, containing the skeleton showed he had defended himself to the last. Just behind the Norfolk skeletons, Mr. Edwards came across the remains of about fifty men, who had fallen in a grim hand-to-hand struggle. The bodies of the British and German soldiers were found in a trench, the heads of the latter facing seawards and the bodies of the British facing towards their adversaries' lines.
