Bequests of Year Amount To \$11,328.

### BUY NEW HOME

Dr. Campbell's Will Gives One-Tenth of Estate To Home For Incurables.

At the annual meeting of the Women's Christian Association, held yesterday afternoon at the Y. W. C. A. residence on Wellington street, Mrs. Helen Marshall was again elected president of the association, in spite of the fact that her resignation had been handed in some time ago. The financial report read by Mrs. W. E. Kelly showed the association funds to be in excellent condition. \$11,000 more this year had been invested in the capital account of this \$4,207.50 is in the bank and \$1,450 invested. The bequests this year amounted to \$11,328.70, and were as follows: Mrs. Horseman, \$2,000; Thomas Sedway, \$7,000; George Robinson, \$200; Mr. Carrothers, \$200; donation D. S. Perry Company, \$100; Shore estate, \$315; Miss Annie Andrews, \$500; Miss Margaret McConaghey, \$733.97; Dalton Charity Fund, \$273.73.

In addition to these the Government grant for the Aged People's Home was \$2,238.95; for the Victoria Home, \$7,000.17; and the city grant for the Aged People's Home was \$7,332.50, and for the Victoria Home, \$1,640.20. The total receipts for the Aged People's Home this year amounted to \$24,526.93, and the total expenditure \$22,520.17; for the Home for Incurables the total receipts were \$27,517.95 and the expenditure \$20,663.62. Adding to these the figures for the nursing and relief work, the grand total receipts were \$57,136.50 and the grand expenditure \$45,551.81.

Interesting reports were read by the various officers and conveners, the report of Miss Margaret MacDonald, the secretary, referring to the will of the late Dr. Campbell, who has left one-tenth of his estate for the Home for Incurables in memory of his mother, who was an interested member of the W. C. A. for many years. This report also referred to the excellent work of Mrs. Ingram, convener of the improvement committee, in her location of the newly purchased property for the Home for Incurables on Grand avenue in London South.

### FORMER ADVERTISER OFFICIAL SUCCEUMBS

Lud K. Cameron, Former Popular Citizen, in California When Death Occurs.

The death took place in Santa Monica, California, on Friday last of Lud K. Cameron, ex-king of the printer for Ontario, and a former Londoner, who some years ago was one of the best known and most popular men in the city.

The late Mr. Cameron was a brother of John Cameron, founder of The London Advertiser, with whom he was associated in journalism here until ill-health forced him to abandon a promising career. Two other brothers, William and Alexander, were also connected with The Advertiser. Lud K., who was the youngest of the four, was predeceased by the other three of the family.

He married a Miss Harwood, formerly of Princess avenue, this city, and had several children.

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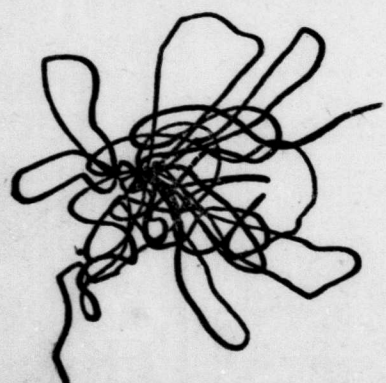

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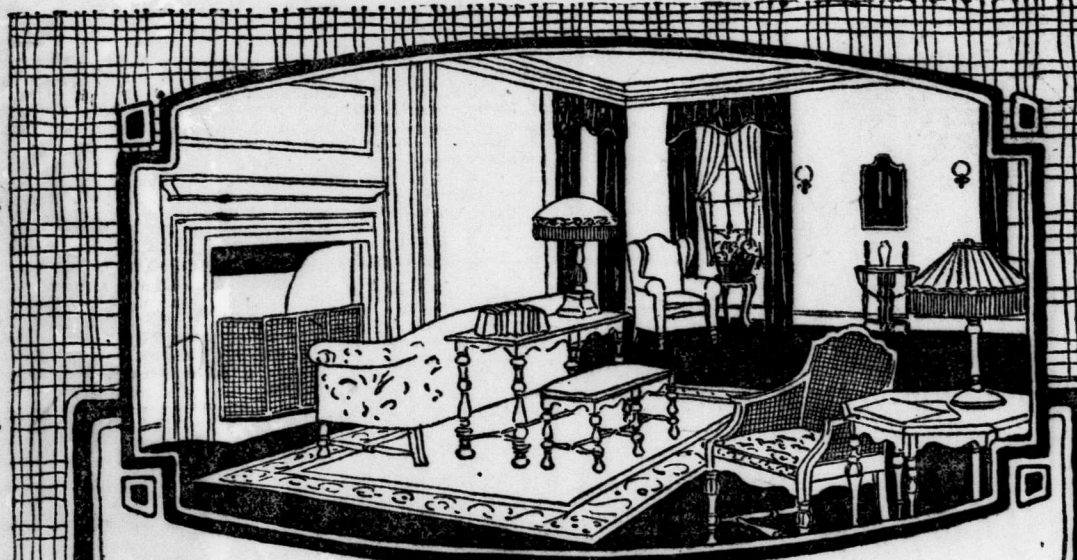
