Made Mistake.

"They cut through and obtained the money, finding to their dismay that they had made a mistake in their selection. Undaunted, they started on the second vault, but their supplies of liquid air gave out when about half way through. Fearing discovery they abandoned their equipment and fled, and that is how the authorities obtained possession of it. 


