Big Saving to Railways in Grain Handling.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—The large grainshipping interests of the Chicago Board of Trade have decided to join forces with the eastern grain exchanges in opposing the order of the Interstate Commerce Commission, prohibiting the payment by the railroads of an allowance for the transfer and elevator service performed by the grain elevator companies.

The regular allowance that has been paid at Chicago for many years amounts to one-fourth of a cent a bushel, and it is stated that if it were eliminated the saving to one large eastern road alone would amount to about \$500,000 a year.
