

EVERYTHING READY FOR FAIR OPENING

Record Entries in Some
Classes of Provincial
Winter Show.

POULTRY COMING IN

Exhibitors Are Busy Getting
Their Stock Comfortably
Quartered.

Guelph, Ont., Nov. 29.—Everything is in readiness for the opening of the Provincial Winter Fair at Guelph tomorrow, and today at the big building the exhibitors are busy getting their stock comfortably quartered. In the poultry department the entries are coming in by the hundreds, and will be in position when the judging starts tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. The extra space will all be utilized for the wonderful exhibit in this department of the winter fair, and this morning saw birds as far west as British Columbia and entries from the United States already in the building.

This morning also saw the arrival of the horses, the first to come being two splendid looking Clydesdale stallions, the property of W. T. Colwell of Ontario.

In the sheep department, which has a record breaking entry list, the first to arrive on the scene were a pen of 100, owned by E. Barbour of Millburg, and a pen of Shropshire, belonging to W. H. Beatty of Wilton Grove. P. Arkell & Sons of Teeswater also have their Oxford in, A. and W. Whitlaw of Paisley Block will have the largest exhibit this year that they have ever had at the winter fair. Their lot will arrive on Friday and will consist of 20 Leicesters and grade sheep.

One of the extra attractions which the fair will be the musical rides by the members of the 6th Battery. The soldiers, under the direction of Lieut. Drew, are daily rehearsing at the camp, and will no doubt prove one of the features of the fair. They will put on their ride on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

The poultry will be the only exhibit where the judging starts on Friday, the other classes starting on Monday.

After the big fair opens tomorrow the general public will not be admitted until Saturday. The dairy test, one of the big features of the show, began at 1 o'clock tonight, when the 14 cows were milked out and will continue until Sunday morning.

VETERANS AT WINNIPEG WILL RESPECT LAURIER

Association by Resolution Affirms Determination Not to Emulate
Kitchener Crowd.

Winnipeg, Nov. 29.—The Army and Navy Veterans Association here disavowed any suggestion that opposition should be offered to Sir Wilfrid Laurier speaking in Winnipeg, and in a resolution stated: "We stand for the utmost freedom including freedom of speech, and we would deprecate any attempt in Winnipeg to imitate the example of the rowdies at Kitchener, who denied the prime minister of Canada the right to address a public meeting by interrupting or in any way embarrassing Sir Wilfrid if he chooses to speak in Winnipeg."

NEW ELEVATOR ORDERED.

Port Arthur, Ont., Nov. 29.—The Bulkhead Co-operative Elevator Company will construct a new hospital elevator on the Port Arthur wharf and waterfront at a cost of \$400,000. It is to be ready to handle the crop of 1918. The unloading capacity will be twelve cars per hour and shipping capacity to the boats 40,000 bushels per hour. The Canadian Northern elevator "B" will be rebuilt during the winter at a cost of \$500,000.

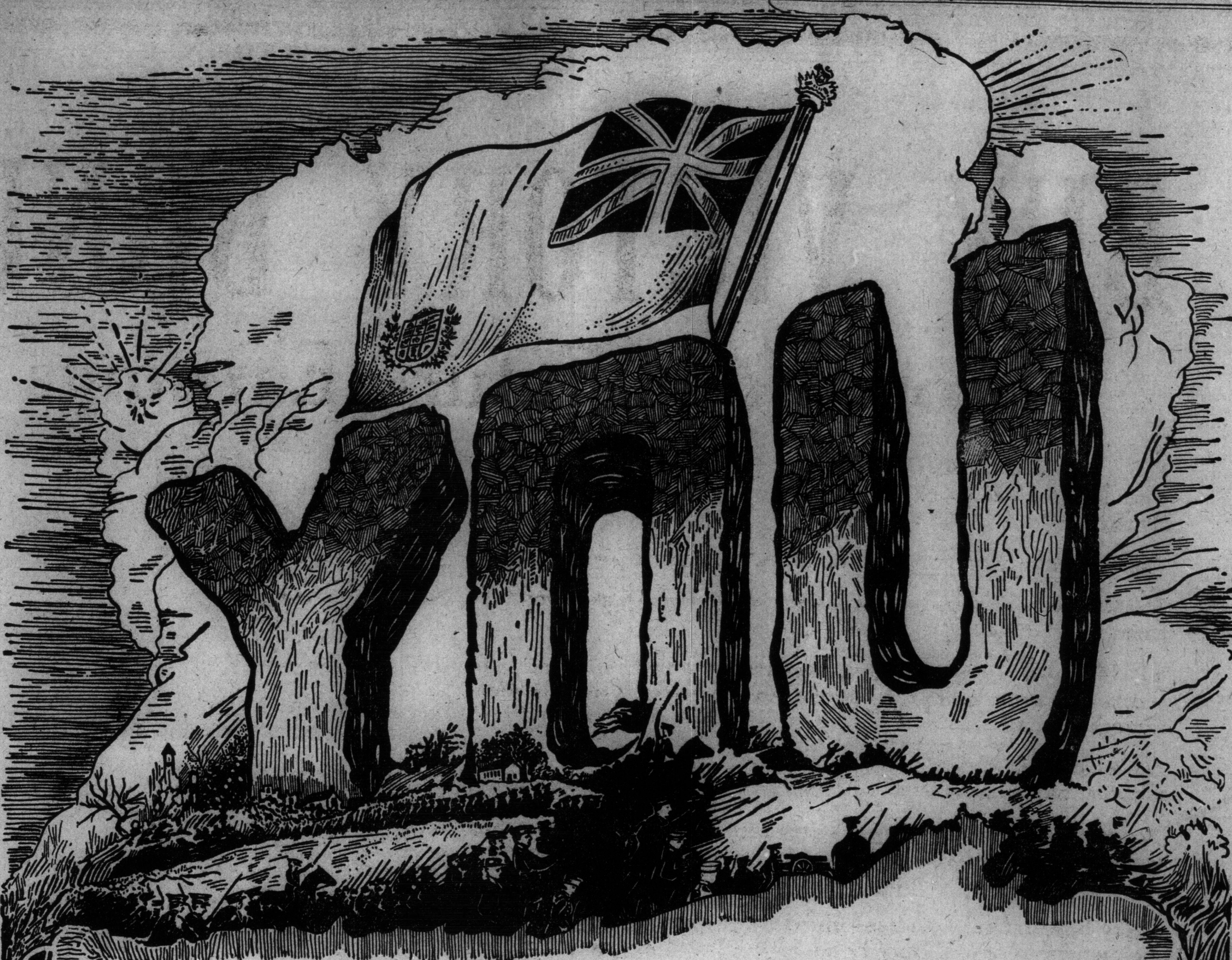
ENDANGERING MEMORIAL.

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THIRTY MONTHS GIVEN FOR NOT REGISTERING

Civil Servant at Ottawa Refused to
Comply With Conscription.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—Harold Morris, civil servant, charged with refusing to register under the terms of the Military Service Act, was sentenced to two and a half years in Kingston Penitentiary by Magistrate Askwith in police court this morning. Morris, who comes from Montreal and is 31 years of age, was employed as a clerk in the lands branch, department of the interior. He was arrested two weeks ago because of certain remarks he made publicly to the effect that he would not comply with the Military Service Act. Being in class 1 it was his duty to either report for service or claim exemption. When arraigned in police court he told the court that he was opposed to the war and would not submit his case to the arbitration of a military tribunal. He

ALL CANADIAN TROOPS SUPPORT GOVERNMENT

Straw Vote in One Battalion Goes
Practically Unanimous Unionist.

London, Nov. 29.—A straw vote taken in a Canadian battalion at one of the English camps resulted in practically a unanimous vote for the government. One senior officer, who was a prominent Liberal before the war, now on leave from France, declared today that the support of the men is swinging solidly for the government, now that the issue is becoming clear, adding that fighting men have no use for pacifists.

CITY A LAW BREAKER

Brantford Breaks One of Its Bylaws,
Says Trades Council.

ALBERTA'S LOAN TOTALS.
