BRANCH OF VETERANS' ASSOCIATION ON THE NORTH SHORE Organization for Campbellton and Resigouche District—Dominion Membership Now 18,500 S. C. Tippett is leaving St. John today for Campbellton to organize a branch of the Great War Veterans' Association there for Campbellton and Resigouche districts. This is Mr. Tippett's special duty with the C. W. V. A., he being the only one permitted to perform any organizing duty as provincial delegate for New Brunswick, which position was allotted him at the convention held in Winnipeg in the summer meeting of this year. Any district or township or city in the province has to communicate with him, and he gives the required information and, if possible, attends personally to the matter. Lieut. Larsen is the applicant for the formation of a branch at Campbellton. The latest returns of membership of the dominion received by the St. John branch give the number as 18,500 in the dominion and rapid weekly increase. St. John numbers 290 active members now. A return is issued quarterly.

FAIRVILLE TO HAVE A FOOTBALL TEAM Fairville has done pretty well in amateur baseball for the last few years, and is about to break into football now—a line of sport that has been neglected since the days of the late Mr. Fairville, who was a member of the St. John team. The personnel of the squad has not yet been announced, in fact the boys are mulling over their plans; but it is generally understood that a local man who knows a good deal more than he says about the game will show them the game from start to finish, and then some. A fast team is promised. Among the aspirants for football honors are, it is said, some of the team of the Glens Baseball Club, along with others who never follow that exhilarating pastime and are anxious to get into another game more suited to their individual aptitudes. Rumor has it that the first practice will be held early next week in Dawson's field, and the prospective players may be assured of a good attendance of fans when the word gets round.

POLITICAL CRISIS IN NEWFOUNDLAND PASSED St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 31—The political crisis, arising from the rejection, by the legislative council, of the Business Profits Tax Bill, unanimously endorsed by the national government, has been settled without resorting to an appeal to the country. Since the formation of the national government, the hitherto unsettled political atmosphere has been clear, though an intense sense of indignation is felt by the public over the reports of the high cost of living commission, which have shown that many millions of dollars have been reaped through excessive profit by business men, many of whom have seats in the legislative council. The Business Tax Profits Bill, though not retroactive, levies a tax of 20 per cent. on all business profits in excess of \$8,000. This is a modified measure, its first form having for a tax of 25 per cent. on all profits in excess of \$2,000. The bill, even when modified by the lower house, was rejected by a vote of nine to seven. His opponents said they objected to the principle of the measure, though the public at large, and the members of the lower house were of opinion that personal interest governed their actions. It not being constitutional to reconsider bills, the parliament closed, and again convened in an extraordinary session. On recommendation of the national government, Governor Davidson appointed four new members, Hon. Messrs. Mews, Cook, McNamara and Bell, who at once voted in favor of the Profits Tax Bill, which thereupon became law. In the lower house, after heated addresses vigorously condemning the attitude of those opponents of the measure destined to increase the pensions of the country's soldiers and sailors, a parliamentary bill of August, 1911, was unanimously passed, defining more clearly the rights of the legislative council, and reserving to the lower house full right to deal with money and similar bills.

THIEF LOOTS STRONG BOX IN POLICE STATION Chicago, Sept. 1—It is learned that a thief on Wednesday night broke open the strong box in the South Chicago police station and secured with the money, watches and jewelry taken from prisoners and left there for safe keeping.

AT THE DOUGLAS BOOM Fredericton, Sept. 1—Rafting operations of the St. John River Log Driving Company at the Douglas boom are proceeding steadily. No estimate of the quantity of lumber rafted during the season can yet be made. The scarcity of labor has been felt at the Douglas boom since spring and that fact, together with the late start in the spring, and the June freshet, made operations slower than usual. The demand for men for harvesting and potato digging may affect the supply of labor. Recently some of the St. John mills have been getting few rafts on account of the way in which the logs ran into the jam above Douglas.

CHINA AND THE WAR Peking, Sept. 1—The Chinese press is urging that a foreign commission be sent to advise and assist the government of China in preparing plans for participating in the war. The Peking Times declares that China must appeal to foreign capitals for assistance as it cannot do so without the declaration of the Allies, except in the form of interest bearing loans. As a result, the newspaper concludes the government is facing embarrassments which intelligent direction could have obviated.

CHARGE CONSPIRACY IN RESTRAINT OF TRADE New York, Sept. 1—Sixteen manufacturers of automobile accessories and William M. Webster, commissioner of the National Association of Automobile Accessory Jobbers, and nearly a score of other individuals have been indicted under the Sherman law by the federal grand jury, charged with conspiracy to restrain trade.
