## Recruiting For Month of August

Of 421 Signed on in New Brunswick 161 Enlisted in St. John; News of the Soldiers

The total number of recruits secured in the province of New Brunswick during the month of August was 421. The county of St. John took the lead with 161.

Two recruits were secured at the recruiting office yesterday afternoon: Bernard F. Haley, St. John, and Harry T. Jones, Springfield, making the total for the day six.

Arrangements have been definitely made by Lt. Colonel Guthrie with Hon. F. B. McCurdy, the under-secretary of militia and defence at Ottawa, for the recall of men from the front to take the positions of officers and N. C. O.'s with the 280th Kiltie Battalion. This means that the 280th Kiltie Battalion will be officered by returned men.

A report from Ottawa says that the old order that threatened the existence of the 182nd, the 145th and the 163rd N. B. battalions has been countermanded. The units will now proceed to England as units, whether at full strength or not. These battalions will all proceed to England some time soon.

Although the Times announced some time ago that J. K. Scamell was to be command of a draft of machine gunners, it was not until yesterday that it was officially confirmed. The complement of the unit consists of one lieutenant and fifty men. The headquarters of the unit will be in St. John.

Lieutenant J. L. Lawlor of Newcastle is to command an overseas draft of field artillery. He has the honor of leading Canada's first field draft recruited particularly for service at the front, the other units of this kind authorized being field artillery depots.

F. W. Sumner, agent general for New Brunswick, has received a number of letters from men of provincial units thanking him for letters and books which he sent them. Letters have been received from Private C. E. Beagut, Private Arnold E. Frame of Sydney street, and Sergeant C. H. Richardson of 181 Union street.

**Baseball Under Fire.**  
 London, Sept. 7.—The American Austin Mason, of Boston, claims the base ball champions of the world saluted, having defeated the other three amateur sections of this sector and also Norton and Harles ambulance units.

**GOLF.**  
 Canadian Fails to Qualify.  
 Philadelphia, Sept. 7.—Most of the favorites qualified on Monday for match play for the amateur golf championship of the United States Golf Association in the thirty-six hole qualifying round held at Merion Cricket Club.

W. C. Fownes, Jr., of Oakmont, a former holder of the amateur title, led the field of 128 starters with the low medal score of 153, which is one stroke lower than the best at Detroit last year, when Dudley Mudge was medalist. Mudge was one of the favorites who failed to qualify today, as he took 172 to complete the round.

Other favorites who failed to qualify were G. S. Lyon of Toronto, Canadian champion; Phillip Carter, of Nassau; Fred Herreshoff, of National Golf Links; Sherill Sherman, of U.S. Albert Sackey, of Riverside, and Hamilton Kerr, of Ek-wapak.

 To the Editor of The New York Times: The public links at Van Courtlandt (two courses), and at Pelham Bay (one course), are now so crowded that one is obliged to wait sometimes three and four hours before getting a chance to play. Saturdays and Sundays one has to wait even a longer time. This after-noon I paid a dollar for a (free) privilege! If the city will not be willing to furnish an additional eighteen-hole course at Van Courtlandt Park, just north of Mottville avenue, on the excellent unused land there along Broadway (there is sufficient unused land for two full courses), a great many taxpayers will have to give up golf.

The rate increase of golf each season is about 30 per cent. Chicago has more golf courses than we have. Why not devote the north end of Van Courtlandt to the gentle pastime? There is plenty of waste land.

**"SURRENDER OF BAVARIANS"**  
 Wet Through in Thunderstorm, Send Officer to British Lines

(By Philip Gibbs)  
 British headquarters, Aug. 31.—Some of the extracts I have given for the past few days reveal the sufferings of the Germans. More eloquent than these letters is the dribbling in of men who surrender willingly.

One significant little episode was that told briefly in today's communique. In that ditch called the intermediate trench northwest of High Wood was an advanced body of German soldiers. British got their machine guns to work at about 4 o'clock and put an artillery barrage behind it. A thunderstorm completed the painfulness of the situation. It flooded the ground and made a bog knee deep. Through the dark mist a white flag fluttered, and presently with this emblem a tall figure came over to the British lines.

There is no doubt the morale of the troops opposed to the British in the front line is not as high and proud as one would expect from the Prussian Guards and picked troops. The men are nerve-shattered by the continual British shell fire and they have no enthusiasm.
