Tris Speaker, once with the Boston

Cleveland, pays a very nice compliment

to Harold Janvrin, utility infielder of the

Red Sox, and a Boston boy. Says

Speaker: "If Harold Janvrin ever overcomes

one fault that now mars his play, he will

be heralded as one of the greatest individuals

in the history of the game. For years I was a

team-mate of Janvrin, and I know he is a

player who appreciates the wonderful natural

ability he possesses more than I do.

"He can go a great distance to his right

or left and make the hardest kind of

chances look easy. He has a striking

throwing arm and can let the ball go

from any position. He is a good man at

touching a runner.

"No doubt you are wondering what

can his weakness possibly be. Well, here it is—a slow bounding ball, hit directly at him.

"On such balls Janvrin always appears

to start a trifle late. He is so wonderfully

fast that when he goes into high speed he usually overruns the easy

chances. Only such balls made trouble

for him in the big series. Regular work, I

believe, would soon overcome the fault,

and then a more finished fielder than Janvrin

would be hard to find."

Carpentier is Said to Have Mailed Contract

French Champion's First Opponent Will Be Les Darcy, Australian Champion

New York, Dec. 28.—Not only has Tex Rickard outgeneraled his rivals in the matter of getting Les Darcy into the Rickard-McCracken camp, but he has beaten them to a frazzle so far as Georges Carpentier is concerned.

It developed yesterday that the contract sent by the promoter to the French champion had been signed and was on its way here by mail. The only thing that delays Carpentier's departure for New York is the form incident to getting his leave of absence from the military authorities.

As powerful interests are working to that end, there is small doubt that the rough will soon be granted and that second foreign champion will arrive on Manhattan Island. It is a foregone conclusion that the first match to be staged by Rickard will be one between Darcy and Carpentier, as Willard, owing to the arduous demands of his managers, has been sidetracked by the promoter.

From all points of view a Carpentier-Rickard match will be the better. It is advisable if a Willard-Carpentier

match would be a good one even from a

box office standpoint, as the disparity in size would militate against keen interest in the bout. On the other hand, there probably would not be more than ten pounds difference between Darcy and Carpentier, which would not be much of a handicap to a man of Darcy's combative disposition and physical ruggedness.

A contest between Darcy and Carpentier would be sure to create intense interest, for it would be a battle between a particularly skillful boxer with a good punch and a heavy hitting fighter who never has been knocked off his feet.

If the bout went the ten rounds there is small doubt that the Frenchman would be the winner and the only question would be the ability of Darcy to drive home one of the crushing blows that aid low McGorty, Chip and other husky fighters.

BASEBALL

New Giant Pitcher a Star

Middleton, a Louisville pitcher, who will be a member of the Giants next season, has one of the best records in the American Association, according to the official averages which were announced by that league. Middleton won twenty-one and lost nine games. An average of only 2.01 earned runs per game were made off his delivery.

He struck out 137 batters and gave sixty-six bases on balls. Carter of Indianapolis was the real leader among the pitchers, and he won fifteen and lost four games. He gave only 1.65 earned runs per game. Palmero, who will be with the Giants again next season, was also with Louisville, and he won eleven and lost six games.

Old Roger Bresnahan, manager of the Toledo club, had a perfect catching record for the twelve games in which he played. Beck of Kansas City led the first basemen in fielding and Lewis of Milwaukee and Kansas City led the second basemen. Walsh of Louisville and Milwaukee was the best fielding third baseman and Roach of Louisville led the shortstops.

Barney of Louisville, who was formerly with the Yankees, was the first of the outfielders in fielding and James of Louisville led the pitchers in fielding.

Louisville, winner of the American Association pennant, was first in team batting with Toledo second and Columbus third.

Brown's Contract Up.

Mordca Brown's contract with the Chicago club will not expire until Jan. 1, but it is explained that notice of his release was given him so that he might have opportunity to hunt a new job. As a pitcher, however, Brown seems to be done, and it is not likely he will elect to continue in the game. The contract under which Brown has been working with the Cubs is the one he signed with the St. Louis Reds at the beginning of 1914 as manager of the Stouffes.

Pratt Had Most Assists.

Eddie Collins, who led the American League second basemen in the fielding

averages, accepted fewer chances per game than did Nap Lajoie. Collins batted 750 chances in 135 games, or an average of 5.58 chances per game, while Lajoie batted 638 chances in 103 games, or an average of 6.18 chances per game. Derrill Pratt of the Browns was most active, in 135 games he had 203 chances, an average of 6.09 a game.
