





County Secretary J. K. Kelley, K.C., reported that, acting under authority granted at the last meeting of the Municipal Council, he had awarded the Colbe Publishing Co., they having submitted the lowest tender. The bonds will be issued under date of July 1, 1926, and will bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent. 


