SAINT JOHN TO BE REPRESENTED AT CONVENTION

W. C. Cross and Frank
Whelpley to Credit Men's
Meeting in Vancouver

On Saturday Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cross will leave on a trip to the Pacific Coast. The main object is to permit the attendance of Mr. Cross at the annual convention of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, of which he is president for New Brunswick, and which is to be held in Vancouver from July 12 to 15.

Mr. and Mrs. Cross will travel via the C. P. R., going by boat through the Great Lakes and will visit friends en route in Toronto, Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina and Calgary. At the latter place they will join the delegates from Ontario and other places east and north of Calgary and travel by special train to the coast.

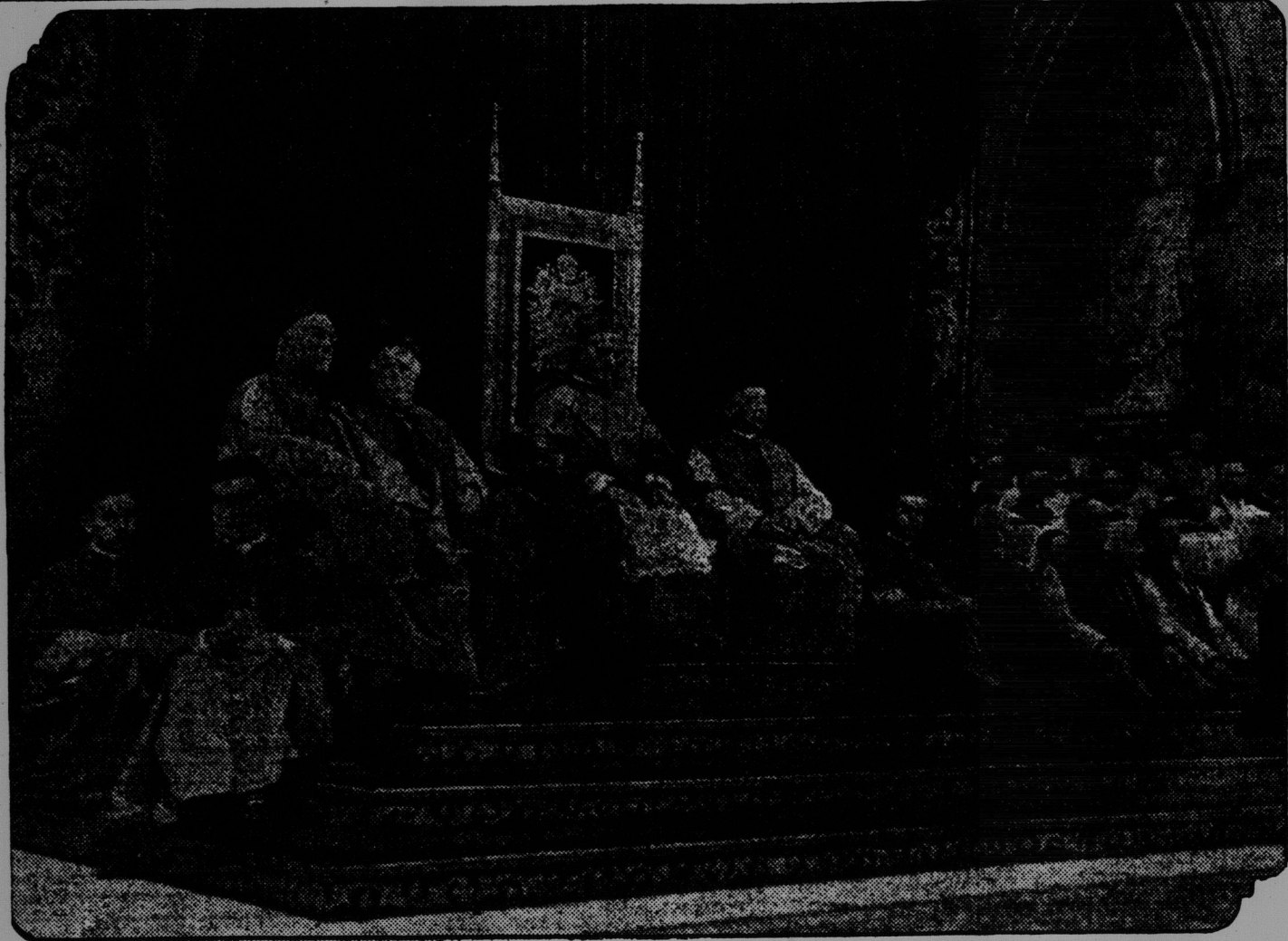
WILL VISIT BROTHER

After the convention Mr. and Mrs. Cross will visit in California, going to Redlands, about 25 miles outside Los Angeles in the orange growing district. In Redlands Mr. Cross will visit his brother, Henry S. Cross, who left Saint John in 1886. It has been fifteen or sixteen years since Mr. Cross has seen his brother. Returning home, they will come through the Western States, making stops at Salt Lake City, Denver and other places, returning via Omaha and Chicago. Other delegates will return home via the Canadian National Railways through Jasper Park.

WILL GIVE ADDRESS

At the gathering in Vancouver, which will be the first national convention of the association, Mr. Cross will deliver an address on "The Proper Method of the Distribution of Goods." Other papers, written by S. F. Jamieson and G. S. McBeath, of this city, will be read at the meeting. The delegates will arrive in Vancouver on Sunday, July 11.
