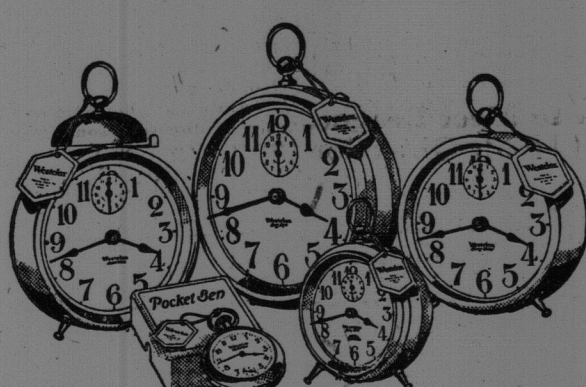

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MONTREAL BRANCH OF K. K. K. TO MEET

Slated For Opening Work Dec. 7 With Big "Kleagle"

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—The local branch of the "Klansman Klux Klan" numbering about 300 members, will, it is said, unless something happens to prevent it, hold its first meeting here December 7, probably in the outskirts of the city. This meeting was to have taken place last month, but organizers postponed it on account of the election campaign.

Preparations for the forming of a "Kleagle" in Montreal have been under way for a long time, and are now almost certain to mature in a few weeks, stated one authority on the subject today. Among the local members are lawyers, doctors, other professional men and many office clerks.
