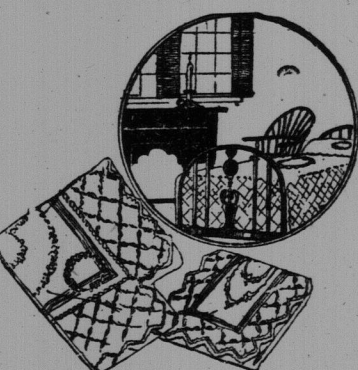

N. B. BOYS' WORK BOARD MEETS

A meeting of the New Brunswick Boys' Work Board was recently held in the city at the Y. M. C. A. with A. H. Chipman, president of the board, in the chair. Waldo C. Machum, newly appointed Boys' Work and executive secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council, was present and outlined plans for future activity of the board. The board decided to hold an older boys' conference in St. John, November 14-16, the local arrangements to be made by the St. John Boys' Work board. This conference will cover St. John, Kings and Queens counties. Plans were also discussed concerning the summer camp policy for 1925, and certain new features approved, including a camp for younger boys, and a leadership training camp at Chipman. A good spirit of enthusiasm prevailed and the future of the board's activities are full of promise. Mr. Machum also met the executive of the St. John board when plans were laid for the Boys' Conference. W. T. Denham being appointed conference secretary. Mr. Machum was for more than five years, field secretary of the Board of Religious Education of the Maritime United Baptist convention.

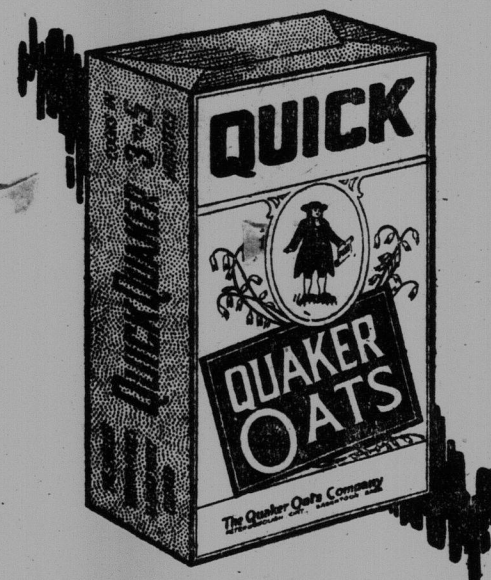
