**HEALTH MEETING PRAISES ANIMAL RESCUE LEAGUE**

Members of the Board of Health, at a meeting yesterday, spoke highly of the work of the Animal Rescue League headquarters for stray dogs and cats, following an announcement by Commissioner Wignout that the city council had come to the conclusion that it was a matter for the board to consider and deal with. Petitions have come to the council, he said, from time to time asking for the removal of the league's headquarters in St. David street as the people in the vicinity claimed it was a nuisance. Dr. Warwick produced a letter addressed to the council in which he stated that he could not say the establishment was a nuisance. It was especially well conducted. The matter was discussed at length and it was decided to leave the matter over as there was some chance of parties at East St. John taking care of all dead animals such as previously was done by animal fertilizer works, before it was burned down.

**League Of Nations Society Branch Is Formed At Moncton**

Moncton, May 3.—A local branch of the League of Nations Society in Canada was formed in Moncton last evening at the conclusion of an address by Sir Robert L. Borden, former Premier of Canada, on the League of Nations.

Sir Robert is president of the Canadian organization. The address was given at a banquet of the local Canadian Club in the hall of the Central Methodist Church, with the president of the club, Ivan C. Rand, presiding. Sir Robert gave a comprehensive account of the work of the League, which was followed with interest by the audience.

He held forth on the League and its organized and its efforts in the interests of peace among the nations. He offered criticism of the League that it is not as advertised more as the work it is doing. In conclusion, Sir Robert spoke of the importance of the League and its efforts in the interests of peace among the nations.

Mr. Rand spoke briefly on the desirability of having a branch of the League of Nations Society in Canada organized in Moncton. Mr. Richard Moncton, secretary of the Canadian organization, also outlined the aims of the Society.

**FLOOD IN SYDNEY**

Sydney, N. S., May 3.—Hundreds of cellars in the area bounded by Townsend, Mackenzie, Brooklands and Morrison streets, were flooded yesterday by a deluge of water which came down the Wash Brook, when Kehoe's dam in the hills back of the city gave way before the unusual freshets. At some places lakes several feet deep were formed and street traffic was obstructed. Several small bridges were torn away and the district drained before serious damage was done, but property loss will be considerable.

The gasoline tax is now a law in 16 States—Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, Montana, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota and Washington. In all cases the rate is one cent a gallon, except in Oregon, Maryland and South Carolina, where the rate is two cents.

**SIDE WHARFAGE RATES REDUCED IN MARITIMES**

Vessels Loading Lumber and Other Materials Will Pay Minimum Charge of Fifty Cents a Day on 400-Ton Vessels.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, May 2.—An important reduction in side wharfage rates charged to vessels loading lumber and other materials at railway piers in the Maritime Provinces has been arranged. It is announced, as the result of conferences between William Duff, M. P. for Lunenburg, and J. A. Smith, vice-president in charge of traffic of Canadian National Railways.

On a vessel of 400 tons, loading 425,000 feet of lumber, the charge was from \$70 to \$100 per cargo, with rates

for 600 ton vessels ranging from \$150 to \$200 per cargo.

While Mr. Duff, representing vessel owners, argued that the side wharfage charge was unjustified, he agreed to a minimum charge and a mutual agreement was reached whereby a minimum charge of fifty cents per day would be made for 400-ton vessels with corresponding rates for ships of other capacities.

**KING'S ALUMNI WANT IDENTITY OF COLLEGE KEPT**

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Considerable debate on the question of college federation, the annual meeting of the Associated Alumni of King's College here today adopted the following resolutions:

"Your committee, recognizing that this association was first formed and continues to exist only for the defense of the honor and the maintenance of the privileges of King's College, would urge upon the governors the vital importance of maintaining a definite assurance before entering into a confederation with other universities that the confederating arts shall be on an equal footing, that King's College shall not be merged in one of the existing universities and that a central university set up shall have a neutral name."

Archdeacon F. W. Vroom, Windsor, was elected president of the Alumni and Dr. H. A. Smith, Halifax, vice-president.

Rev. J. H. A. Holmes, St. John, and W. H. Roach, Windsor, were elected governors of King's College today to fill the vacancies caused by the retirement by rotation of L. H. Martell, M. P., and Canon W. E. Harris.

**1,284,900 UNEMPLOYED.**

London, April 11.—(By Mail).—The number of persons on April 8 recorded on the live registers of the Employment Exchanges in Great Britain as wholly unemployed was 1,284,900. This was 41,670 more than in the preceding week, but 200,778 less than the figure recorded on January 1, 1923.

The increase occurred principally in Lancashire and Cheshire. The total included 984,000 men, 41,400 boys, 222,800 women, and 86,700 girls.
