Since the signing of the armistice 140,-000 men had been returned. The 130,000 remaining should be cleaned up by the end of July with good luck and no untoward later developments. He paid a tribute to the United States government which has relinquished its claim to ships of the Mauretania and Aquitania class. Sir Edward said his decision to return to Canada was due principally to family reasons.

Lieut. Col. W. E. Prowse, D. S. O., of Charlottetown, is in command of No. 1

He was formerly attached to the Bank of Montreal and is well known in Peterboro, Ont, St. John and Halifax.
