Amateurs, Under Auspices of Irish Literary and Benevolent Society, Delight Large Audience—The Cast

"When We Were Twenty-One," the comedy-drama which was staged last evening at the Opera House by members of the Irish Literary and Benevolent Society, was a decided success. The house was filled with an enthusiastic audience who showed their appreciation of the work of the amateurs by their frequent applause.

The story is one in which Richard or "Dick" Carewe is the most important figure. His cousin, Richard Audaine, known as the "Imp," falls in love with a dance hall girl, Dick, however, wants his to marry Phyllis, the daughter of his housekeeper, but his wife secretly marries the dance hall girl and is indignant with Dick for interfering with his affairs. Dick afterwards learns that Phyllis has a strong affection for him, and as he has loved her for years their affairs are happily adjusted.

Probably the most difficult part was that taken by D. J. Carr, who acted the part of Richard Carewe to perfection. Miss Stella Pyne took the part of Phyllis Ericson, the daughter of Dick's housekeeper, and although she had a difficult part to play, she proved herself equal to the occasion. Miss Caples played admirably in the part of Kate Glyneske. Fred A. Hazel had a difficult part in the role of "The Imp," but his part was decidedly well taken.

Miss Kathleen O'Malley as Balletic, was much admired. Miss Vera King was seen to advantage as Budgie, and Miss Gertrude King won praise in her part as Mrs. Ericson.

The excellent presentation of the play showed the results of careful preparation. The elaborate specialties between the second and third acts were attractive features of the evening. "When Cupid Comes A-Tripping," which was put on by Miss Florence Halpin and T. Chip Olive, was much appreciated. Between the third and fourth acts "You Want to Go To Tokio," a piece, delighted the audience, the singing of Gerald McCafferty being heartily applauded. The specialties were arranged and directed by John A. Kelly and won him hearty praise. Miss N. Barry was accompanist.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Golden Corn Cake

Use twice as much Indian meal, yellow cornmeal, as wheat flour and the same amount of butter, in weight, as sugar, leaving out yeast working ingredients (rice) and a suitable flavoring is a little of both nutmeg and cinnamon.

Mix together, while dry, a scant half-teacup wheat flour, 1 heaping teacup sugar. Soften a full teacup of butter and beat well 4 eggs, emptying both into center of dish containing dry ingredients. Gradually mix the wet and dry together, and beat the whole considerably longer than you would an ordinary cake batter. It does well baked in a tin 10 inches long, 6 1/2 inches wide and 2 inches deep. The oven should be moderately quick, allowing one hour's time to bake. It is usually well to allow a little longer.
