

Girls of This Theatre Not Equalled in Any Chorus Though Effort Has Been Made to Outrival

(London Standard).

"The stage of the Gaiety Theatre," said a philosopher recently, "is the playground of England's future noblewoman." No theatre in the world has given more beautiful women to the aristocracy, and the announcement that Miss Olive May, who plays Lady Rosabelle in "The Sunshine Girl," is to marry Lord Victor William Paget, brother of the Marquess of Anglesey, makes another addition to an already long list of romances of the stage.

The reason for this preference for Gaiety chorus girls on the part of aristocratic young men seeking a wife, arises apparently from the fact that the theatre has laid it down that only the prettiest girls will be allowed to join the companies. "We have to get beauty," said the manager to one of our representatives yesterday. "That is part and parcel of our creed, and it takes some getting, for there are signs that beauty is becoming scarce. Hundreds of girls apply to us for positions every week, but though many are called few are chosen. We will accept any nationality—but we draw the line at color. Any white woman who is pretty and can sing well, who has an 'appearance' on the stage, and who can act, has a chance of getting on the Gaiety stage, and these tests are made in every case. At present we have girls from every part of the

At the present time the chorus girls, numbering about fifty, include beauties from Wales, Ireland, Scotland, France and England, but the management has not yet been able to make up its mind which country produces the best looking actresses. Several members of aristocratic families are among the women of the chorus and some time ago it was found that the members were going into matrimony scrapidly that a special clause forfeiting a certain sum if marriage took place during a season had to be introduced into the contracts. This helped to retain the girls but even the forfeit has been unable to keep one or two from leaving to get mar ried.
