Way do I fear the Cub?

One good reason is because they are the only team which took two games from us on the western trip. They looked better on the field than any of the other westerners. They are thinking all the time and playing "Evers baseball," which is the lightning brand and hard to beat. When his pitching staff cracked Evers still kept the Cub in the race and now that he has more reliable twirling, he is apt to shoot them up to the front to mix it with the Giants to a finish. They are a team which is never licked and one that will take a lot of beating and still come back.

Credit to Archer

The clever Cub machine has more right and staying qualities in it than any other team in the west or east, to my mind. Archer, behind the bat, is a world of strength and one of the shrewdest catchers at working his own pitcher that ever put on the chest protector. He is largely responsible for the recent good box showing of both Humphries and Smith. Archer is always talking to a pitcher and steadying him and keeping him out of the hole. Besides this defensive work, "Jimmie" is hitting better than he was and is becoming very important as a run getter. He showed up particularly well in that branch in the series with the Giants.

Ester has turned out to be a good first baseman and fits into the Cub style of play very well. He is a bulldog for hanging on, although he has not the aggressive manner of some of the other more pronounced Cubs such as Archer and Evers and Zimmerman. Evers and Bridwell are working smoothly around second base, and "Al" appears to have completely recovered the use of his legs and his old time speed. Zimmerman, who has been having some trouble with the management, is said to be back in line and working hard for the machine because he thinks there is a great chance of the club pulling out.

The infield is a beauty. The outfield is well balanced and smooth with Schulte, Mitchell and Lench, all old stagers and smart and dangerous at the bat. The pitching staff was what has been bracing all season, and Humphries, Smith and Cheney look as if they might deliver some reliable ball for a time. If overall can get back into shape, he would round out the corps in fine style. The natural ability of these pitchers is increased by the excellent handling they receive from both Archer and Bresnahan.
