

The reactionaries have sought to catch dissatisfied votes by picturing the return of the monarchy as just around the corner, though this issue has been kept fairly in the background by most agitators. All sane politicians realize that the time for the monarchy, if it comes at all, has not been reached yet. Had 460 Delegates.

The last Reichstag numbered 406 delegates, the largest in history.

The North-German Union, the first German Parliament, numbered 293 delegates.

The Zollparlament (custom parliament) that succeeded the North German Union on 1868 increased the number of mandates to 363.

The first Reichstag of the empire increased this number was maintained throughout the years from 1871 until 1911.

During the 1912 elections this number was increased by nine more delegates. Thus, the last Reichstag of the empire numbered 392 members.

This number was immediately increased after the revolution. The National Assembly, set up for the promulgation of the Constitution of the new republic, numbered 425 delegates, while its first Reichstag increased this number to 466, including thirty-nine women.

During the legislative period of 1912 to 1918, 55 per cent. of the delegates had had a college education. This proportion decreased to only 29 per cent. in the first Reichstag of the republic.
