

Kellogg, of Minnesota, whose election as Secretary of State to succeed Charles E. Húghes, was announced last month. The nomination to fill the third vacancy—that of Charles B. Warren, of Michigan, to be Attorney General-was made early in January, and has met with so much opposition that ad-ministration leaders in the Senate have hesitated to seek confirmation at this session.
