CALE BRINGS DESTRUCTION EASTERN U.S. AND CANADA SWEEP BY BLOW

Several People Killed And \$1,500,000 Damage Done

MANY ARE INJURED

Wind, Rain, Snow and Sleet Leave Trail of Wreckage Over Wide Area

CHICAGO, April 20.—A severe wind and rain storm, approaching the proportions of a tornado in some localities, swept a destructive course from Wisconsin to New England yesterday.

Several persons were killed and approximately 1,500,000 dollars worth of property damage was estimated at more than \$1,500,000.

Two persons were killed in Peoria, Ill., while a man was electrocuted at Macomb, Ill., when he picked up a live wire.

In Central Illinois, Peoria and Pekin were the hardest hit. In Peoria where property damage was estimated at \$500,000, two night watchmen, George Wender and Frank Hammett, were killed when the walls of the Walker Hardware Company's plant fell.

In the residential districts of Peoria, trees were uprooted, porches torn away and roofs sunk in. Families fled into the streets, fearing a repetition of the recent tornado.

A plane bombing village on the Syrian frontier to punish a native chief who refused to make peace with the British, drew intense rifle fire and was brought down in flames.

Revolt Was Short

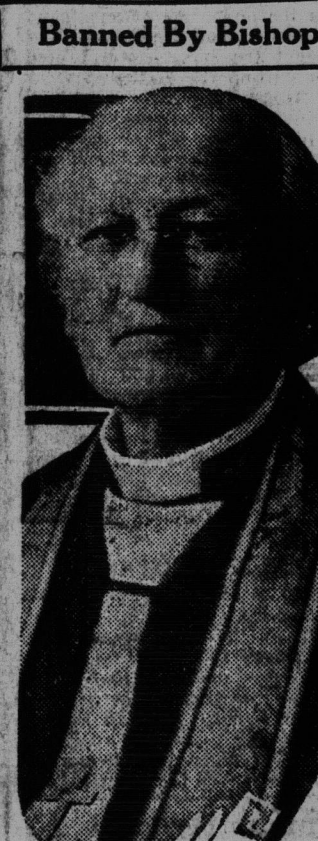
