#### GEORGE BELL MOVES UP

WIDELY KNOWN RAILROAD OF FICIAL IS PROMOTED.

In Thirty-Five Years Mentreal Man Has Risen From the Bottom of the Ladder to Be Passenger Traffic Manager of the Entire Grand Trunk System - Is Member of Many
