A DOUBTFUL BENEFIT.

Whether the concession regarding the appointment of the commander-inchief of the Canadian militia, obtained by-Sir Frederick Borden from the war office, will be for the benefit of Canada or not is doubtful.

The new system may be good for the militia in so far as it holds out to Canadian officers a prize for which they have not been eligible heretofore, and so may induce more to enter the service. And if a suitable Canadian can in time be found, a man with the knowledge of military affairs and of the needs of Canada, required for such a position, his local sympathies may reduce the friction that has often developed between that position and the Canadian militia department. But against these and other possible benefits are very obvious dangers.

The greatest of these is the probability that the office will be used for political patronage; that like all other places of appointment under the government, "pull" will take the place of all other qualifications in an applicant. Already it is rumored from Ottawa that

He originated and pressed upon the Canadian government the extensive improvements in the or-ganization of the militia for which Sir Frederick Borden is now claiming the credit. No Canadian, however able, is provided with the experience and special knowledge acquired during long active service, that would qualify him to do the work Lord Dundonald has

The Canadian officers, of high rank, notable evidence of superior ability and with hardly an exception succeeded in earning the hearty hatred of all their men. One man prominently mention-ed as Lord Dundonald's successor is South Africa earned more general ex-
