OTTAWA UNIVERSITY MAY BE ABOLISHED Subject Seriously Discussed by Oblate Fathers, But No Definite Plans Decided Upon.

OTTAWA, Jan. 1.—Rumors still fill the air in respect to the future of Ottawa University, the latest being that the chapter of the Oblate Order in Rome has seriously considered a recommendation to fill it. A few days ago it was reported that it would be continued as an English educational only. This was denied by the university authorities, who are equally certain that there are no truth in the latest rumor. The one outstanding fact in connection with the Ottawa University situation is that the chapter of the Oblate Order has a delicate problem to solve. In addition to financial difficulties there has been friction between the English-speaking and the French elements, and in a pamphlet issued during the summer months the charges were made that the university authorities have been moving steadily in the direction of the Frenchification of the institution. This has been denied by Archbishop Duhamel, who shares with the Provincial of the order the control of the university. A definite decision by the Oblate Order is awaited with keen interest by the French and English-speaking Catholics of the district, the majority of whom cling to the belief that further efforts will be made to make the university a success on its present dual basis.
