DOG DAY ON JUNE 1ST.

Magistrate Issues Ultimatum to Those Who Have Not Taken Out Licenses.

This morning in the police court Magistrate Ritchie took occasion to remark that on Monday, June 1st, would be known as "Dog Day," and that all persons who had not taken out licenses for their canines would be liable to a fine of four dollars.

The police of the southern division have reported that there are no less than 400 persons who do not take out licenses. The West Side report has not yet been received, but from the 124 persons so far reported does not give the exact number of dogs that are unlicensed, for in some houses there is more than one dog, and it could be safely said that the number of unlicensed dogs in the city at the present time will reach over the two thousand mark.

A policeman called at a house the other day and found three dogs receiving breakfast. The lady of the house seemed confused at the officer's untimely arrival, for she said: "Well, if I had known you would be about here so early this morning, I would certainly have had two of these dogs out of sight." Her husband will now have to pay for three dogs. There are many such cases in the city and despite the fact that the police have been vigilant there are many dogs that have been missed.

YOUNG GIRL'S SAD PLIGHT

Arrested for Lying and Lurking Says She Has No Place to go.

In the police court this morning Joseph McCarthy, aged 25 years, was remanded to jail on the charge of begging from door to door on Canterbury street.

Annie May Carlin, an 18 year old girl, was remanded to jail on the charge of lying and lurking in a yard off Millidge street, and not giving a satisfactory account of herself. The unfortunate young girl has been wandering about in a questionable manner for some time and this morning told the police she had no place to go. She was arrested in a skirt that had been made for a tall lady and as she entered the court it had to be held up to keep from dragging on the floor.

LEINSTER ST. CHURCH FIFTY YEARS OLD

Started as Marsh Bridge Church and Has Had an Interesting History.

Leinster Street Baptist Church commences its anniversary services tomorrow in commemoration of its founding fifty years ago.

The church has had an interesting history during the last half century. Its organization was the development of a Sunday school which was conducted by city Baptists on the other side of the Marsh Bridge and was first called the Marsh Bridge Church. It commenced with fifteen members who came from the congregations of Brussels St., Germain St., Amherst and Martins Churches. The first pastor was Rev. E. T. Demille, and the first service was held in March, 1858.

Soon after this as the number of members from the city increased a branch of the church started in Ritchie's Building, Princess street.

In 1881 a lot was purchased on Leinster street, adjoining the present site, and a church building was erected there. At this time the Marsh Bridge services were discontinued.

In the big fire of 1877 the church building was destroyed and soon after the fire the corner lot was purchased and the present building erected.

The church has steadily advanced and under the present pastor, Rev. Wellington Camp, the membership has increased to three hundred and fifty.
