THE VULTURE OF LANES.

It is a Rare Bird and may Soon Become Wholly Extinct.

It appears that birds of prey are not so rare in the European mountains as is generally supposed. A teacher of Biology, in the district of Digul, in France, was hunting not long ago in the mountains in the outskirts of the village. He saw on a rock two birds of prey devouring a lamb. He took aim at one of them and was fortunate enough to knock it over at the first shot. It was a "barred gyrfalcon," the vulture of lanes. This bird, formerly so common in the Pyrenees, the high mountains of the Tyrol, of Switzerland, of Germany, of Corsica, and of Sardinia, has almost disappeared from Europe. So the capture made by M. Martin is of scientific interest.

The bird was sent to the laboratory at Marcelline. It is a beautiful specimen of the species. The span of the wings measures two metres of centimetres. The length of the back to the extremity of the tail, one metre 20 centimetres, and weight over six kilograms.
