Experiments in tobacco culture in Ontario and Quebec are turning out fairly well, and it is thought that tobacco may be raised in certain parts of the maritime provinces.

Knights Templars Here Today.

The Albert Commandery Knights Templars of Fitchburg, Mass., will arrive here tomorrow by the Eastern Line steamer Calvin Austin. They will be about 150 in number. As the law regarding arms and flags is not held to apply to visiting fraternal societies the visitors will carry their arms and flags. The local Knights Templars in command of Thomas E. Power, commander of the encampment of St. John will escort the visitors from the boat to their headquarters at the Victoria Hotel. In the evening the Albert Commandery will formally visit the Encampment of St. John at their rooms where the order of the Red Cross will be conferred by the visitors, after which the traditional banquet will take place. On Saturday the visitors will be taken about the city and they will leave at night by steamer for home.

LITTLE TOTS LOST IN HOLIDAY CROWDS

Police Station Proved Welcome Refuge for Two Wandering Children — Parents Called for Them.

Despite the fact that yesterday morning, afternoon and night the streets were thronged with thousands of people and excitement was intense, there were no accidents reported and the big celebration was carried through in a most orderly manner. The only reports of interest on the police books for the day and night recounted the finding of two lost children.

About 9:30 o'clock Policeman McLaren accepted a four year old girl who had been found on Charlotte street. She said her name was Evelyn Scott, but she did not know where she lived. The kind policeman made the little tot comfortable with some candy and she finally fell asleep on one of the lockers in the central station. It was after 11 o'clock when her mother called for her and took her home to Brussels street.

Last night a Hebrew boy, who gives his name as Marvin, was found by the police on Brussels street. The youngster would not tell where his home was and just before midnight he was taken to the guardroom in the central station where he was made comfortable and at an early hour this morning he was sleeping soundly on one of the lockers.

Another little child was found on Charlotte street yesterday afternoon and taken into a residence where it was called for by anxious parents, shortly afterwards.

TORCHLIGHT PROCESSION AND FIREWORKS CLOSED GREAT DAY

St. John's Celebration of King George's Coronation Ended with a Blaze of Pyrotechnic Glory — Brilliant and Beautiful Illuminations, Tired but Happy People and a Great Holiday.

The evening programme in connection with the Coronation celebration was carried out without a hitch. The torchlight procession was a spectacular affair, and made a hit with the crowds. After it was over a pyrotechnic exhibition was given from the south side of King Square, which contained many striking features, and gave pleasure to the biggest crowd ever seen on King Square.

The Torchlight Procession. The torchlight procession of the Firemen was witnessed by an immense crowd. Led by Chief Kerr, and the Artillery Band, and with District Engineers Blake, Jackson, Brown and Ring in charge of the various divisions, the firemen, accompanied by their apparatus, paraded some of the principal streets, lined with thousands of spectators. Fireworks and Illuminations.

A magnificent display of fireworks concluded the programme of Coronation Day. At ten o'clock an illuminated balloon rose from the roof of Barry's stable, on the south side of King Square, trailing a string of colored lights after it. At a great height it rained a shower of sparks of all the colors of the rainbow, and sailed on with a fire blazing at its tail to consort with the stars. Then, with a great hissing, colored rockets began to erupt upwards over the Square, trailing streamers of light, and bursting into multi-colored showers of sparks. At intervals illuminated balloons, some shaped like fish, and others like animals, were sent aloft, carrying streamers of light; rising vertically to a considerable height, and then drifting away to the south and west. The display was kept up for about half an hour.

A great crowd was massed in King Square, watching the display. The Square itself was illuminated with strings of colored lights, hung along either side of the pathways. The band stand in the centre of the Square was ablaze with lights. The Loyalist fountain was outlined with incandescent bulbs, and over the top was an arch bearing the inscription in letters of light: "God Save the King."

The Court House was decorated with incandescent lights, and, with its array of royal colors and flags, presented an imposing effect. Inside, looking out of the windows facing the Square were many of the City Fathers and public officials with their ladies. The hotels and other buildings about the Square were also illuminated, and their windows were crowded with veils of girls watching the pyrotechnic display.

At 10:30 o'clock the Square with the lights gleaming through the foliage, and the rockets every few seconds bursting with sharp reports, and flinging showers of colored stars across the sky, presented a scene of enchantment and a strange quietude seemed to possess the crowd, as if they were subdued by the beauty about them. Near the fountain a boy, sprawled on the grass, his head in his mother's lap, slept through the roar and crash of the rockets.

In other parts of the city business establishments and private residences were illuminated in various ways. Along King street the electric light illuminations were in many cases of a gorgeous character.

The results attained fully justified the efforts put forth; the club house and surroundings presented an attractive appearance, and both the afternoon and evening proved enjoyable, and served to emphasize the fact that the R.
