The new owners intend to renovate it to suit their requirements and will remove them from their present quarters at 72 1-2 Prince William street.

PEJEPSCOTT PAPER CO. The sale of the controlling interests in the Pejepscott Paper Company and subsidiaries by the W. H. Parsons Company of New York, to Julius H. Barnes, of Chicago, is announced. The property includes four mills in Maine and Nova Scotia timber in Maine, Quebec and Salmon River, St. John Co., N. B., and a fleet of tug and barges. The sale price is estimated to be in excess of \$750,000.
