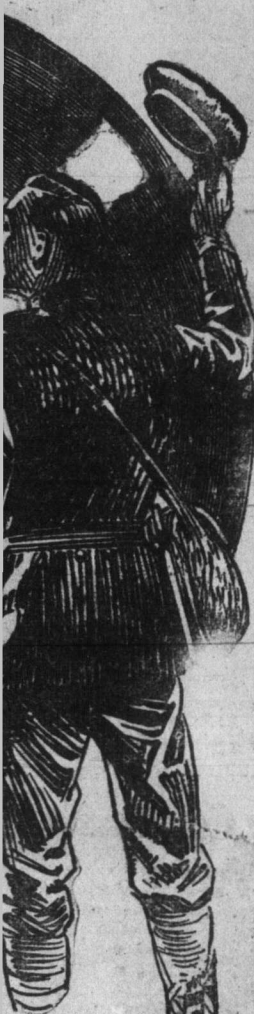

Poles Have Lost Vilna

TO THE BOLSHIEVICK ARMY.

Warsaw, Jan. 9.—Vilna has fallen into the hands of the Bolshievick army, several thousand strong, which drove out the Polish militia. A massacre of civilians began at once, partly because the Poles had offered resistance and had arrested or shot the members of the local Bolshievick committees.

The Polish troops, who had no cannon and only a few cartridges per rifle and were under command of Gen. Vaitko, retreated to Lanovora, where they were disarmed by the Germans and sent to Biaystok. There they were robbed by the Germans and were started off for Polish territory.

Lemberg Still Safe.

Lemberg, where the Poles are defending themselves against the Ruthenians, appears safe for the time being.

The political situation at Warsaw is stationary. As a result of interviews which Ignace Jan Paderewski has had with Gen. Pilsudski, Paderewski has agreed to form a new Cabinet, provided the Socialists now holding places in the Ministry withdraw from their predominating position. Gen. Pilsudski expressed his authority to force the withdrawal of these Socialists.

Paderewski is working hard and making appeals to patriotism. He declares that he, himself, is willing to sacrifice every ambition if only a Cabinet can be formed which the allies will help only, when Poland is internationally united.

Outbreak At Riga.

Prince Eustache Sapieha, who led the recent attempt to overthrow the Government, is still in prison. He was arrested by the personal Red Guard of Minister of the Interior Thugnat, who himself had previously been arrested.

Refugees from Petrograd say that the streets are full of starving people, many of whom have money, but can get no food. There has been an outbreak in Riga. The population is said to be composed of Letts and Estonians, who for the most part are Socialists and opposed to property-owning and the aristocratic classes, who are of German origin.

Messages from Kiev report that the city and district quiet, now that there is no longer anything left to steal, or land owners left to rob or kill.

Kiev Joining Moscow.

Kiev seems to be joining up with Moscow.

Leon Trotsky, the Bolshievick Foreign Minister, and Nikolai Lenin, the Bolshievick Premier, are making overtures to the Ukrainians, saying that they have no wish to turn over the Ukraine Government to the opposition. Workers' congress have been formed at Kiev, one Ukrainian and the other Russian. The Russian Congress is entitled the workmen's and soldiers' deputies, and is a tool of the Bolshievick. Both congresses have declared that they do not wish intellectuals among their members.

Farmers' committees have been formed here to distribute public lands and the lands stolen from the landowners.

LONDON PROPOSES NEW PHONE SYSTEM.

London, Ont., Jan. 9.—As a result of the action of the Bell Telephone Co. in seeking to increase its tariffs the City Council at its next session will consider a proposal to establish a municipal telephone system here. Chairman Philip Pocock of the Public Utilities Commission has had the matter under consideration for some time, and is reported to be favorably inclined to the scheme.

Canada's Present

drods of millions of people in the Asiatic countries. The connecting link was Canada reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The route to the East sought by the explorers hundreds of years ago via the Atlantic was a reality and Canada was her transportation system and her geographical position was this medium.

How Will We Use Our Heritage?

The solidity of any country depends upon the industry in that country. Canada's future upon the way we would use the heritage left us by those pioneers who by their sweat and toil laid the foundations. And therefore the future place of this country in its relationship to the future international questions depended upon the way in which we put to use to which we had fallen heirs.

Can Never Be The Same Again.

Referring to the ways in which Canada must meet her problems the speaker emphasized the fact that the sufferings and trials caused by the war had wrought great changes in men and women. People today talked more freely from their hearts than before the war. After this baptism of suffering they could never be the same again. One today saw matters from a different view point.

Problem Will Be Adjusted.

In emphasizing the necessity for giving every consideration to the returned men he stated that there would be difficulties. Not that there was not the will or the necessary money, for there were both. After the sufferings and sacrifices of the men all would be ready to help in the returned men. But the difficulty would be in the men becoming refitted for civilian life. Patience was the one great necessity. And with a solution worked out by men of the best intelligence the problem would be adjusted.

Must Have Confidence!

Another.

A second point emphasized in his outline for the readjustment period was the necessity of being on the outlook for tendencies to anarchy, which was prevalent in some of the European countries today. It was urgent that men look at and consider problems from a fair standpoint with justice to all. Confidence in one another was necessary as was the avoidance of class prejudices.

Improve the Education System.

In speaking about a third point, the duty to build up a real manhood, the speaker said that in making use of the countries vast resources the highest intelligence was required. He emphasized the need of a thorough educational system in which the ideals of the Empire would be taught and the rising generation fitted for making use of the resources in the best way. Races prejudices and narrow views would have to be replaced by broader views so that these would be a better comprehension of the meaning of a Canadian citizenship.

Integrity Needed.

Integrity and high ideals were essential in the coming period, which would again test the sacrificing spirit of men and women.

The Address Appreciated.

A vote of thanks to Prof. Gilmore was passed on the motion of Mr. B.W.N. Grigg, and Rev. D.A. McKeracher, both of Waterloo. The former pointed out that a review of Prof. Gilmore's excellent address showed that his opinion on the necessities of the country's future could be summed up in these words:

And now abideth, faith, hope and love, and the greatest of these is love.

It should be added that Prof. Gilmore was a Chaplain in the Canadian army.
