READY TO PROCEED WITH ERECTION OF HOUSES

Dominion Tire Housing Commission to Start Ten Houses at Once.

COUNCIL WILL RATIFY AGREEMENT

A special meeting of the town council was held last night having been hurriedly called by Mayor Kutt when he had been informed by the Dominion Tire Housing Commission in the afternoon that the guarantee had been received from Montreal and they were now ready to proceed with their part of the agreement and make a start on Waterloo's allotment of 100 houses which the company intended erecting in Waterloo. When the council convened at 8 o'clock, Mr. N. M. Davison and Mr. Martin were present and both addressed the council. Mr. Davison in opening said he and the company he represented certainly appreciated the speed in which the people of Waterloo move. In commenting on the delay that has been occasioned since the proposition was first brought up, Mr. Davison said they had met with some delay but this was to be expected but he was glad to say that with the arrival of the guarantee they were now ready to go ahead in fact were anxious that a start should be made immediately. The style of houses to be erected would cost approximately \$3500 and the intention was to start them this fall so as to have them completed early in the spring. In answer to a question as to where the houses would be located Mr. Davison replied that as the Commission had considerable property of their own in town this would be built on first and he felt it was sufficient to carry them along for the development they intended to carry through. However, should the property not be adequate they would make purchases and keep on. He and Mr. Martin had come before the Council to get information as to what procedure must now be followed said Mr. Davison. Town Clerk Haight in reply to Mr. Davison said that the Dominion Tire Housing Commission must first apply to the Waterloo Housing Commission and lay their plans before that body who had been invested by the Council with full power to act. The matter would then be laid before Commissioner Ellis for approval and then submitted to Council for ratification. The Mayor and members of the Council assured the gentlemen present that there was no danger of the scheme not finding favor by the town fathers. They were behind the movement and would give their undivided support when it came their turn to act. Mr. Haight adjourned the meeting. Before adjournment Mr. Davison and Mr. Martin thanked the Council heartily for turning out and while nothing could be done by the Council just at present the fact that they were behind the movement was indeed most gratifying and the friendly spirit was indeed appreciated. The meeting lasted less than an hour.

Objective of \$300,000 Has Been Reached.

TOWN MAKES EXCELLENT SHOWING IN VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

Toronto, Nov. 10th. To Mayor Kutt, Waterloo, Ont. Please accept for yourself and officers of Waterloo congratulations and appreciation of Ontario Victory Loan Executive upon your city-to-day winning Prince of Wales Honor Flag. The Patriotic spirit of your citizens and the splendid work of your team members in making the no movement possible brings great credit to your city. Signed G. H. Wood, Chairman, Ontario Executive. The above telegram was received this morning by the Worshipful Mayor Kutt and tells a story that must indeed be most gratifying to all patriotic citizens of the town. When Waterloo's objective was set at \$300,000 it seemed a large amount but with a committee behind the movement that were energetic and with a body of patriotic citizens that were prepared to do their duty, they have gone flying over the top. Although the objective has been reached the committee do not intend to relax their efforts one bit, but now that the Prince of Wales Honor banner has been won extra efforts will be put forth to have the banner decorated with honor crests. It's another case of when Waterloo starts out to do a thing they usually accomplish it and in this case they have brought honor and credit to the citizens of which is undoubtedly "the best town in Canada."

Returned men to be banqueted to-night. What promises to be an event out of the ordinary will take place to-night in the Library Hall when the Waterloo quota of returned men will be tendered a banquet by St. Quentin Chapter I. O. O. E. The banquet will be served at 6.30 o'clock and will be followed by an interesting program including vocal and instrumental music and speeches.

The meeting called for last evening by the Victory Loan Campaign Committee in the town hall was unavoidably postponed owing partly to the inclement weather and on the short notice in which it was arranged. A number however turned out but not enough to warrant holding the meeting. However, the fact that Waterloo went over the top is proof positive that our citizens do their duty and will continue to do so when the call comes.

The reason he had brought the matter up was that a local contractor had informed him that if outside contractors were allowed to work their men on Sunday he would do the same. The Deputy Reeve was informed that the Council had nothing to do with the matter although any private citizen could lodge a complaint if they so desired. There was no discussion on the matter whatever.

DISTINGUISHED CONDUCT MEDAL

Local Veteran Received It To-Day

An appropriate signal of recognition of heroic services has come to a veteran of the great war. To-day Pte. J. Bochoven, of 22 Dan Street, city, received the Distinguished Conduct Medal which was awarded him last year. The handsome medal was sent through Lt.-Col. W. J. Brown, A.A.G., M.D., No. 1 District, London, Ont., who enclosed his congratulations. The medal was awarded Pte. Bochoven for the exemplary work done on the front during the battle of the Somme. He was one of the first to enter the trenches and was the first to capture a machine gun nest, which was hidden about 25 yards away did the damage which secured the twenty-five enemy men in the trenches into submission. One bomb out of five which he had thrown. Three men were killed while the others after surrendering were taken back into the allied lines. On August 11th, Pte. Bochoven was taken prisoner. He was a prisoner of the 27th he escaped into Holland, his native country, from which he had come to Canada nine years previously. Here he resided in civies until towards the end of the year when he secured a position at the docks where returned prisoners from Germany were being handled. He handled, and returned to England and returned to Canada. He immediately settled here. Pte. Bochoven enlisted in Winnipeg on Jan. 12th, 1915, with the 78th Grenadiers.

FARMER CABINET NEARLY COMPLETE

Premier Drury, is speeding up his Cabinet construction. He is authorized for the statement that men have already been selected for five of the ten portfolios. These five include Mr. Beniah Bowman, M.P.P. for Manitoulin, as Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines, and Mr. Manning, Peel, as Minister of Agriculture. Mr. W. F. Nickle, of Kingston, until recently in the Ottawa House, will likely be the choice for Attorney-General. A new name has been put forward for Minister of Education, that of Dr. George H. Locke, head of Toronto's Public Libraries. Toronto was destitute of its new governmental members over the weekend. Everyone from Premier down was many miles from the seat of government. Mr. Drury spent the past day and a half on his farm near Barrie. He may not return to the city until this afternoon. His prospective cabinet ministers are taking a longer holiday and some will not be seen in Toronto again until after the announcement of the new cabinet by the U. P. O. leader.

TORONTO, Nov. 11.—58 new cases of smallpox were reported during the past 24 hours, of which 54 are being quarantined in their homes. There are now 127 cases in the city and 193 houses are under quarantine. Persons in quarantine but not ill, number 706. There are 24 cases in the hospital.
