
The following are the industries, portions of which were omitted : Carving and gilding, cooperage, dressmaking and millinery, engraving and lithographing, gold and silver smithing, musical instrument making, patent medicine manufacturing, saddle and harness making, saw and file cutting, ship material making, tin and sheet-iron working and wood-turning, to the aggregate amount of \$300,000, above mentioned.

Actual errors in the Census are few as compared to the real errors made by the critics of the Census.

A few instances will show : Watchmaking and jewellery-making are industries said by the critics to have been, to a large extent, overlooked.

Our watchmakers and jewellers, as a rule are merchants, and cannot be said to convert anything of importance, but when they do so they come under the more appropriate class of "gold and silversmiths."

In the same way photographic galleries cannot be called manufactories, because the proprietors of these galleries do not make the materials used by photographers.

The same may be said of dentistry. What raw materials are converted by the dentist? The manufacture of dental material is another thing.

One of the critics gives an instance of gross blundering, but he should rather have given it as an instance of his own misquoting.

The instances referred to are "book-binding and edge-tool making." For bookbinding the figures appertaining to boot and shoe making are quoted. In edge-tool making, at page 445, third line from the bottom, the totals for New Brunswick, \$48,460 are given as the value of products, while it is said that in the summary tables they are omitted, but nevertheless they are there in their proper place. See page 509, eighth line from the bottom.

It appears to be scarcely necessary to take up time and space in the report with notice of the remarks made on the shipping, because the objections were all answered when the criticism appeared, but there is one thing that must be alluded to, "the withholding of another volume which is confessedly inaccurate." If such a volume were ever withheld it was prepared without the knowledge of any one connected with the Census room, which, need scarcely be said, was impossible. The fact is that no such volume was ever made or contemplated, that nothing is withheld, and that no compilation of any kind has ever been or is withdrawn from the public eye, and no manipulation of figures has been resorted to or allowed.

Many of these errors of the critics have their source in the fact that several known industries are mixed in various establishments which must be recorded under one title, because it is positively impossible to discriminate between them and make up accounts for each separate element of the joint industries.
