I have been reading over Eugene Forsey's criticisms of Wade's book. This is the fellow who has been lauded as an author, by Canadian Professors, etc. While he does not get the scorching that Macaulay administered to Montgomery, he really, in the eyes of serious-minded students of history, should stand no higher as an historian than Montgomery stood as a poet after Macaulay got through with him.

(2) There was no shadow of change in my attitude toward protection in the '26 election campaign. Never have I heard anyone suggest that before.
