September 16, 1924

My dear Harry:

I thank you for your welcome letter of a day or two ago. I was sure you and Jennie would rejoice ~~at~~ the outcome of the by-elections in Quebec. It is doubly pleasing to be able to feel that they are due in no small measure to a policy distinctly liberal and to the publicity which has been given to its underlying principles. I agree wholly with you that what is most needed in politics to-day is education of the public on sound economic lines.

Remembering Jennie's problem with regard to domestics, I asked the Supervisor of Women's Immigration if it were not possible for her to secure a good general servant from among the domestics coming from overseas. Miss Burnham, the Supervisor, communicated at once with the Toronto office, and at her request the Toronto office has, I understand, communicated with Jennie by long distance phone. I hope she will find it possible to make some arrangement through this source as a good general servant direct from Scotland would perhaps supply your domestic needs in this particular better than they could be met in any other way.
