You want to be sure in your own minds that the right thing has been done with respect to acts of the administration concerning which our opponents have sought to occasion doubt. Above all you want to be sure that you are doing the right thing should your ballot be cast as I hope, in your own interest and that of our country, it may in support of the present administration, instead of for some imaginary National Government which, on the day
