## A PROBLEM IN PAVEMENT

City Council Seem up Against it in Connection with the Queen St. Work.

His Worship, Advocates Redress for Head Street Ratepayers—Other Civic Business.

The matter of the Queen street pavement came up again and occupied the attention of the City Council last evening.

When the petitioners asked for a brick pavement they understood that the street could be put down at \$1.85 per square yard. The agent of the Dominion Paving Company wrote to the Council some time ago and offered to put the pavement down for \$1.85 per square foot. When Ald. Mounteer read the letter he explained that it was not a bonafide offer.

Now when the tenders come up for the work the lowest tender is from the Dominion Paving Company for \$2.08 per square yard. The residents on the street object to this high price and Messrs. Davis, Scane and Park addressed the Council.

It was understood, however, that bricks, labor and cement have advanced since the other price was offered. Some of the Council thought that they should re-advertise, some were in favor of laying the matter over until spring.

Moved by Marshall and Taylor, that the matter be left with the Board of Works.

Ald. McCaig moved an amendment, seconded by Ald. Martin, that the matter be left over for two weeks. The amendment lost and the motion carried.

Yeas on amendment—Ald. McCaig, Edmondson and Martin.

Nays—Ald. Marshall, Scullard, Mounteer and Taylor.

Mayor McKeough also brought up the matter of the grievance of the Head street ratepayers. Some time ago sand had been dumped on this street. It had caused annoyance and the Mayor thought that the rights of the ratepayers should be respected. He asked the Board of Works to have the same removed.

Ald. Mounteer had understood that the sand had been removed.

Every member of the Council was present at the meeting with the exception of Ald. Piggott, who is out of town.

The property owners on Wellington road build a plank walk at their own expense from the C. P. R. to the Market.

Applications to cut down trees were referred to the chief of police.

James Lake, Robt. Lunn, A. J. Wilson and A. Faucher were relieved from dog tax.

The firemen will be given their usual holidays and uniforms.

The Industrial committee will deal with the Raleigh Oil Company who want to furnish the city with natural gas.

The Finance Committee will deal with the matter of the G. T. R. hog pens.

Ald. Mounteer gave the report of the action of the court of revision on the public improvements.

The town of Napanee offered \$2,000 for the truck roller. It was decided not to sell it as it is now being used in building pavements.

The Ontario Asphalt Block Company sent their agreement which was signed by the mayor and clerk.

A complaint from S. F. White re city scales was referred to the Property committee.

The ratepayers of Queen street asked that J. H. Milton be appointed inspector of their pavement. Board of Works.

The hook and ladder in the Fire Hall and also for painting and kalsomining the inside of the sleeping rooms and apparatus rooms.

Ald. Martin's report from the Garage committee was referred back for reconsideration.

The city officials will close their offices at one o'clock during the summer months.

The M. Wilson Cordage Company will be given exemption from taxes and free wharfage.

The brick pavement on Third St. will be proceeded with.

Tenders will be asked for keeping the paved streets clean.

Mayor McKeough brought up a few more items on vacant lots and hay on the cemetery road. These will be attended to.

Tenders were then opened: Asphalt block, Lacroix street—Forest City Paving Company—5 inch concrete, large blocks, \$2.65; smaller blocks, \$2.50. Four inch concrete, large blocks, \$2.53; smaller blocks, \$2.38.
