TRUCK DRIVER AND HORSE How a Friendly Understanding De-

The story runs thus: So for three years or more Chieftain had always had a good night pat on the flank from Tim, and in the morning, after the currying and rubbing, they had a little friendly banter in the way of love slaps from Tim and good natured nosings from Chieftain. even better than either realized.
