ICE CUTTING IS STILL IN PROGRESS

Season Lasts Two Months—A Busy Scene on Bay of Quinte How Much Work Two Men Can Do.

Like a wintry graveyard in the plains is a field of the ice cut in the Bay of Quinte, south-east of the Belleville docks. Here lie half hidden in the snow cakes of ice like tumble-down monuments gray worn with time in an ancient cemetery. With a terrific stretch of imagination, and bushes which mark the place, whence ice has been taken might be thought weeping willows or cypresses. The only feature which little harmonized with the burying ground idea is that the numberless teats which ply along the beaten tracks come empty into the "graveyard" and carry their loads away. Not so with a real necropolis. The ice cutting is an industry of rather large proportions. The season lasts for about two months. This year cutting began on January 13th, and since that date tons upon tons of the precious summer luxury have been drawn into the city, stored in ice-houses for ice cream, hotels, restaurants, dairies, and some have even been shipped away to Kingston by
