ENLARGED.—Mr. Rolls, proprietor of the Grand Central Hotel, has decided to enlarge his premises by building an extensive addition to the rear of the hotel. The dimensions of the new part will be 50 x 42 feet. It will be two stories high and will be built of brick. The ground floor will contain a spacious dining room and the upper story will be divided into bedrooms. With these improvements the Grand Central will be one of the most commodious hotels in the city. Mr. E. B. Sutherland has the contract in hand, and the work is to be finished by the 1st November.

MORE LIGHT WANTED.—A good lantern is very much needed at the Grand Trunk depot in this town. On dark nights the elevated platform around the station renders it dangerous, besides which the presence of rough characters at times makes it very unpleasant for ladies who may be waiting there for friends on the evening train. We are sure that the officials of the company only require to have their attention called to the matter, and the public will be accommodated. Were our town authorities to make use of the lamp posts which have been placed along the street, they also would be doing a much needed service.

THE MODEL SCHOOL TERMS.—The first term in the County Model School will begin on Monday, August 29th, and end on Saturday, Oct. 22nd. The closing examination will begin on Thursday, Oct. 20th or Friday, the 21st, at the option of the several County Boards of Examiners. The second term will begin on Monday, Oct. 24th, and end on Saturday, Dec. 17; closing examinations begin on Thursday evening, Dec. 15 or Friday, the 16th, at the option of the several Boards of Examiners. The Minister of Education has the honor to acknowledge the amendments to the regulations for the working of these schools in the future.

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD.—A special meeting of the Board was held on Thursday evening, 18th inst., to appoint teachers for the 3rd and 5th departments of the Public School. Fourteen applications had been sent for the vacant positions. The Board selected Miss Eliza Jane Gordon, of Collingwood, to teach the 3rd department, salary \$275 per annum. Miss Gordon holds a second class Provincial certificate. Miss Emma B. Buchanan was appointed to the 5th department, salary \$235. Miss Buchanan comes from Toronto, and holds a county certificate. This young lady is also capable of teaching vocal music and linear drawing, branches which we believe it is the intention of the Board to have taught in the lower departments of the school.

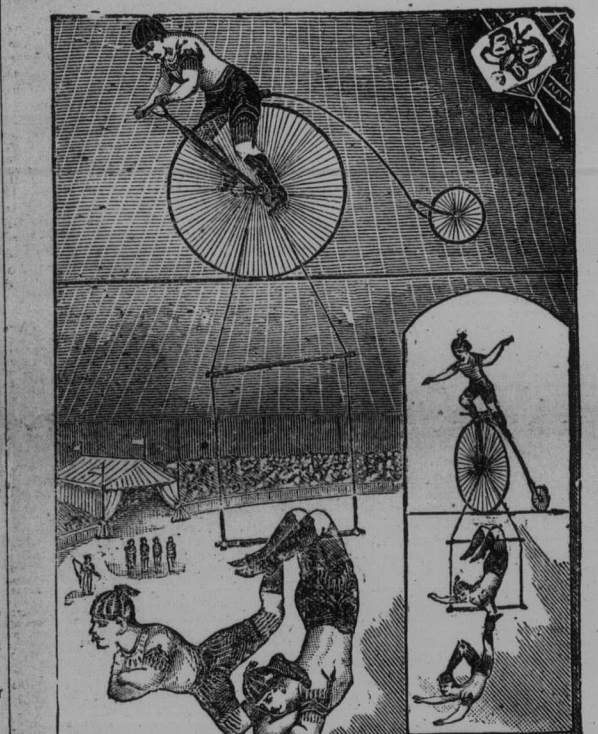
