GRAND MANAN BOY WINS HONOR ON FIELD OF BATTLE

Private Ben Gaskill, a stretcher-bearer in the 26th, has been promoted to sergeant and has been awarded the military medal. This news will be received with the utmost pride and satisfaction by all friends of this gallant young soldier.

Sergeant Gaskill is a son of the late Eben Gaskill, of North Head, Grand Manan, where his sister still resides. He is a brother of Rev. Frank B. Gaskill, of Petite Riviere, Nova Scotia. Sergeant Gaskill enlisted in the 26th in November, 1914.

When in camp at East Sandling, Kent, England, he offered for service as a stretcher-bearer. In that capacity he has rendered faithful service for the last thirteen months and more. He has never missed a "period" in the trenches and has many times been complimented by his M. O. and officers of the battalion on his excellent work.

He was with the battalion in the Somme advance. After the great fight for Courcellette he was warmly congratulated by officers for his gallant and efficient work, and it was then that he was made sergeant of the stretcher-bearers.

Later, in the battle for Regina trench, he had a very trying and arduous time. He was hit once on the hand and again on the foot, but not sufficiently injured to have to be sent out. He had a narrow escape when a shell came through the roof of a dug-out which he was utilizing as a dressing station. He gave himself steadfastly to his duty to the wounded, and came safely through. For his gallantry he has been awarded the "Military Medal."

After a week's rest at a quiet place by the sea, he has returned to duty with the 26th. Chaplain Hooper writes of Gaskill that he has known him intimately during the whole period of his service with the 26th, and found him always, foremost in his duty as a Christian, and at the same time exemplary as a soldier. Higher praise could not be spoken of any man. —St. John Telegraph, Nov. 5.

TOWN COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday, the 7th inst., at 8 o'clock p.m.

Present, the Mayor, G. K. Greenlaw, and Aldermen, Finigan, Gardiner, Hibbard, Dowrey, Shaw, Worrell.

Absent, Ald. Douglas and McFarlane. Minutes of quarterly meeting of Oct. 12, read and confirmed.

The Town Clerk reported in re election for one Alderman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Richard H. Keay. That there was but one person nominated, viz., J. Fred Worrell, who was declared elected by acclamation and who had filed his oath of office.

On motion seconded and carried, the report of the Returning Officer was received and ordered to be placed on file.

In re the assessment of Walter Short in 1905-6, affidavit of Walter Short was submitted stating that he was not in the country at the dates named.

Moved by Ald. Hibbard, seconded by Ald. Gardiner, that the affidavit submitted be accepted and that the Town Treasurer be instructed to cancel the claim on W. Short for taxes. Carried.

Ald. Hibbard, chairman of Finance Committee, reports that he had had a personal interview with Mrs. E. Chase respecting taxation of personal property and that she had promised to submit a statement in due form. Report received and tabled pending receipt of affidavit of Mrs. Chase.

Communications from H. W. Chase in reference for dances, etc., submitted.

Ald. Hibbard, chairman of License Committee, reported that as requested by Council, with Ald. Finigan he had met with Mr. Chase and F. H. Grimmer, Att'y., and that the claim for license fees for dances had been adjusted by Mr. Chase agreeing to pay the Town Treasurer the sum of forty-five (45) dollars in full for dance license fees to date, and on which he had paid twenty (20) dollars and given a note for twenty-five (25) dollars.

After some discussion and a comparison of the license fees paid in the past by the "Andros Club," a flat rate of five (5) dollars per annum covering all entertainments, and a pool-room paying but eight (8) dollars per annum, etc. It was moved by Ald. Lowrey, seconded by Ald. Worrell and carried, That the amount of twenty (20) dollars, paid by Mr. Chase to the Town Treasurer be accepted in full of all claims to date for dances, and that the note for twenty-five (25) dollars given by Mr. Chase to the Town Treasurer be returned to him.

Ald. Finigan suggested the advisability of having the sidewalk on Montague Street, between William and Edward Streets, cleaned and gravelled. On motion seconded and carried, ordered that the Street Commissioner be instructed to have the above named improvements carried out.

NEW CANADIAN FISHERIES

Professor E. E. Prince, Commissioner of Fisheries, has just returned from a tour of fishery inspection in the distant waters of Lesser Slave Lake. The Department of Naval Service has learned that a number of fishermen from the east, including some Nova Scotians, resorted to this fine fishing preserve, soon after the opening of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and R. C. line, which now extends as far north as Peace River Crossing.

On arriving at the west end of the lake at the end of September, Professor Prince found unmistakable signs of winter, for several inches of snow covered the streets of the town of Grouard. After a visit to the Hudson's Bay Fort, the Mounted Police Barracks, and the extensive build-

ings of the Roman Catholic Mission in Buffalo Bay. Dr. Prince with two guides took a sail boat down the lake inspecting the fishing and spawning grounds on the way. There are no settlements on the lake between Grouard and Sawridge, at the east end, and the party had to find lodging at some of the small fishing shacks on the lake shore, and at Indian camps on the north and south sides of the lake. The Whitefish are probably finer in size and quality than those of any other western lakes, splendid specimens being seen which weighed 4 to 8 lbs. each. Only 2 per cent of the fishermen's catches are under 3 lbs. weight. Grayling of 1 to 2 lbs. and large trout 40 to 50 lbs. in weight are caught in these waters. Half-breds and Indians make large captures of fish in the fall and winter, but Lesser Slave Lake is on the eve of a large fishery development. There will be a demand for large quantities in Alberta and Saskatchewan and all over the vast Peace River District. Several Chicago firms are actively engaged in making arrangements to supply the American market from Lesser Slave Lake.

Professor Prince states that the scenery around the lake is very impressive, but most of the timber is spruce and fir and the region abounds in moose, mule deer, bear and small fur animals, while immense flocks of wild swans, geese and ducks, of every kind, were seen during the five days' trip over the lake.
