Justice Davis in delivering his second charge in the case, held as before that if the jury found that Schmidt did not realize the nature of his act he must be acquitted.

HYDRO LIGHTS A BIG IMPROVEMENT

They Were Turned on Last Night in the East Ward With Good Effect.

The Hydro street lights, apart from the ornamental lights, were turned on yesterday for the first time. A portion of district No. 1, as it is known in hydro circles, but to the reader the district lying east of Market street and north of the canal, was the one so favored. About 20 lights were in service and were located on Chatham and Colborne streets.

Those who were in the neighborhood last night, got a good idea of how the entire city will very shortly be served. The wonderful improvement over the old system of street lighting was most marked. Instead of the street being lit up only in the immediate vicinity of the corner, the whole street was lighted.

When asked this morning why the lights were not turned on in the entire district, Hydro Engineer Ireland stated that it is necessary to test each transformer separately. He promised to have the lights in the entire district in service to-night. He would not state when the lights in the remainder of the city would be turned on.

Mace of Irish House of Commons

The very beautiful mace, the emblem of royal authority used in the old Irish House of Commons is now in possession of Viscount Masserene and Ferrard, great grandson of the last speaker of Ireland. It was demanded by the British Government after the Union from Mr. Speaker Foster, who refused to surrender it to any but the constituted authority by whom it had been entrusted to his keeping. Its surrender was not enforced, and it has been in the custody of Mr. Speaker Foster or his descendants from that day to this.

It is unlikely that Viscount Masserene would refuse to restore the Mace to a new Irish House of Commons, having regard to the fact that the Mace now in his possession had been the Mace of the Irish House of Commons from the time of the Parliament of William and Mary in 1692 till the Union. It is a beautiful "bauble," silver-gilt and chaste in ornamentation.

It is not now probably generally remembered that the Mace of the Irish House of Commons was better known to the public than the Mace of the English House of Commons. The Speaker of the Irish House of Commons did not, like the Speaker at Westminster, reside in the environs of the House, but lived in a city mansion. In fine weather he used to walk in his robes--he always wore the robes of State--from his residence to the House of Commons, preceded by the Sergeant-at-Arms, bearing the Mace, and as he passed through the street was received with honors of which Royalty itself might well be proud.
